

Smith, Wynn Star in Cleveland Verdict; Yanks, Braves in Lead

All Lopez claims "As Al Smith goes so go the Indians"—and both Smith and Cleveland were going great guns today.

To hear Lopez talk, the 28-year-old Smith has become Cleveland's new "key man" and that was pretty much the story Tuesday night as the Indians nipped the Senators, 3-2, with the help of Early Wynn's seven-hit pitching.

"Smith is our best hitter in the clutch," Lopez insists. "When he doesn't hit, we don't win. And when he does hit, we do."

Smith collected three of Cleveland's nine hits Tuesday night while boosting his average to .345 and the Indians to within a half-game of the second-place White Sox. He led off the seventh inning with a homer off Pedro Ramos that tied the score at 2-all, then opened the ninth with a double and scored the winning run on Chico Carrasquillo's sacrifice fly.

Strikes Out Nine

Wynn wasn't exactly standing around counting his change, either. He pitched brilliantly in striking out nine men, walking only one and racking up his third straight triumph.

The Baltimore Orioles knocked the Chicago White Sox out of first place in the American League by beating them, 3-2, in 11 innings. Four errors caused Chicago's downfall and it was the last one, a wild throw by relief pitcher Dixie Howell in the 11th, that allowed Bob Boyd to score from second base with the winning run.

The Yankees took over first place with a 9-2 victory over the Tigers as Mickey Mantle and Hank Bauer hit home runs and Whitey Ford posted his third straight complete game victory with a seven-hitter. Steve Gromek started for Detroit but departed in the fifth after giving up seven runs on as many hits.

A perfect squeeze bunt by Joe DeMaestri brought in the winning run in the eighth inning for the Athletics in a 3-2 triumph over the Red Sox. Lou Kretlow hurled a seven-hitter in gaining the decision over Bob Porterfield.

Milwaukee moved atop the National League with a 6-4 victory over Philadelphia. Reliever Dave Jolly pitched his way out of a bases-loaded, none out situation in the seventh inning and kept the Phillies throttled after that to notch the victory.

Redlegs In Sreak

The Cincinnati Redlegs stretched their winning streak to five games in beating the Brooklyn Dodgers, 3-1, behind Johnny Klippstein's six-hit pitching. Klippstein, who defeated the Dodgers four times last year, was in frequent hot water because of seven walks but bore down and pitched his way out of the jams.

Those surprising Pirates won

their third straight game, beating the Cardinals, 4-2, even though Manager Bobby Bragan had to employ three pitchers in the ninth inning to do so.

Curt Roberts' two-run double with two out in the ninth broke a two-all tie and tagged Wilmer (Vinegar-Bend) Mizell with his first defeat after two victories in a row. Elroy Face, who relieved Dick Littlefield in the seventh was the winner but when the Cards threatened in the ninth, Bragan used George Munger, Lino Donoso and Vern Law.

Willie Mays clouted two triples, drove in one run and scored another in leading the Giants to a 2-1 triumph over the Cubs. Jim Hearn gave up four hits and struck out five batters in registering the victory over Warren Hacker.

F. Patterson Given Fifth Heavy Rank

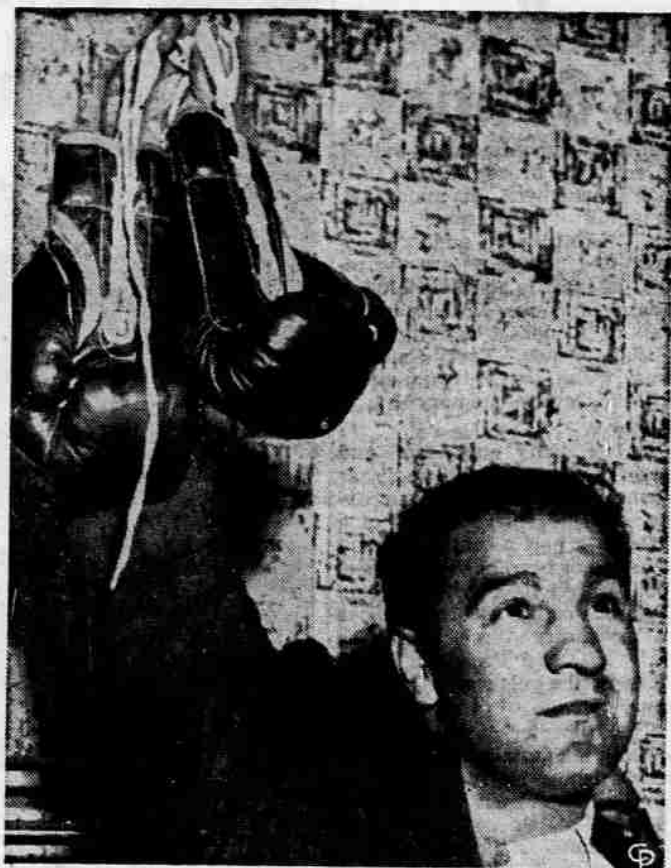
New York—(U.P.)—Remarkable young Floyd Patterson of Brooklyn was recognized by Ring magazine today for the first time as a contender for the vacant heavyweight boxing crown.

Sporting 11 straight knockouts and 16 straight victories, the former Olympic middleweight champion was shifted from top light heavyweight contender to fifth ranking heavyweight aspirant in Ring's latest ratings.

The shift was made so that 21-year-old Floyd can be considered a full-fledged contender for the title left vacant by Rocky Marciano's retirement.

Light heavyweight champion Archie Moore, 39, still is rated top contender for the heavy crown and is the man the others must beat in an elimination tournament to succeed to Marciano's throne.

Freakish Tommy (Hurricane) Jackson of Far Rockaway, N. Y., is ranked second among the heavies; Bob Baker of Pittsburgh, third; Johnny Holman of Chicago, fourth, and Johnny Summerlin of Detroit, sixth.

Is That So?

Approaching San Francisco, our JAL purser hastily passes through the aisle refilling champagne glasses and announces: "Prepare to land in San Francisco International Airport in thirty minutes."

Although still more than 150 miles away, our DC-6 is closing the gap at six miles a minute, a mile to every ten seconds, and we'll soon be home. Home, again in the States. Wonderful.

With modern navigational aids, we know our JAL navigator will make a perfect "land-



fall," but again the thing which impresses: After a 2,000-mile trip how did the Polynesians in their low-slung craft make landfall on tiny islands? Or after a 500-mile trip, pinpoint flat sandy atolls not more than ten feet above sea-level which, reckoning the curvature of the earth, were not visible at ten miles? Counting coconut palms, perhaps 20. And once land was sighted, how did they bring their craft over reefs or land it on steeply sloping shores where no harbors existed.

In the first place, these fabulous navigators—truly the greatest prehistoric navigators that ever lived—were able to estimate the distances, sailed quite accurately and sensed when land was to be expected. Then they searched for signs.

Signs such as?

They knew that certain seabirds fly towards land at nightfall. Other birds made regular migrations, such as the golden plover, whose course could be charted. And finally, there might be an increase of life in the water—certain fish, jelly fishes, and seaweed. With the latter, there would be a faint odor.

And they studied clouds. Because of the difference in temperature which a body of land, even a small atoll makes on the air directly above it, clouds tend to pile high, particularly over such volcanic islands as Hawaii. Greenish Glow on Clouds

With coral atolls surrounded by incredibly beautiful colored water, the sunlight reflected from the water would cast a greenish glow onto the clouds passing overhead making it possible to detect islands many times the distance at which they could be seen.

But should the navigator have failed in all these signs, then possibly a sudden smoothness of the sea would indicate the island's presence because for a number of miles to windward the sea is considerably smoother in windy weather—the space narrowing as the distance from land increases. Even at night or during a heavy downpour, the navigator would know from the smoothness that he was in this triangle. And not too far off.

Finally, animals aboard might help—particularly earth-rooting

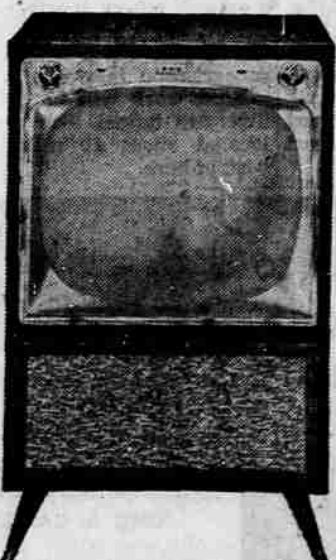
