Belle—He's worse than my first husband
Fred—It's a one-way marriage.

Belle—I have been married for five years to a man who pursued me ardently and persuaded me to obtain a divorce from my first husband. We now have two children, and I have done everything possible to make a good home for him and to make him proud of his family. He, however, has turned into an indifferent husband who acts as though he is martyred because he pays the bills, which he is well able to do out of a good salary.

I listened to his implorings before I broke up with my first husband because my feelings had been shocked by an instance of infidelity that became known to me after I returned from a stay-out-of-town with my mother. I was so shocked and hurt I felt I should do something drastic.

When I told Fred how bitterly I felt about my husband's conduct he urged and pleaded with me to seek a divorce for the purpose of marrying him, and I was angry enough to fall in with his proposal.

Now I find life quite intolerable, as I realize that my first husband merely committed an act of infidelity through weakness while I was away from home, whereas my present husband has no feelings towards me at all. I have proposed, in desperation, that we go to a marriage counselor, to see if something cannot be salvaged out of our marriage, but my husband absolutely refuses.

Fred—I cannot imagine what a marriage counselor can tell us that I do not already know. It is true that I loved Belle ardently at one time, but I hoped that she would love me as much as I loved her. I realized after our marriage that she had little to offer me except her pretty features.

Right from the start, it was a one-way affair between us. I gave her everything, and in return she gave me nothing but her bitterness towards her first husband. She seems to have no positive interest in anything, not even in her children, and she seems to think she is a heroine because she is willing to run a house for us in a rather indifferent manner.

I am not interested in preserving this kind of marriage, but I keep on because I feel it is my duty to take care of Belle and the children.

The Council—Belle was a wrong in obtaining a divorce out of pique and Fred was wrong in pursuing a married woman and playing upon her sense of injury. Now they are doubly wrong, both of them, in nursing their disappointments and depriving their children of their first interest.

These two people have wronged each other, and they cannot make a tolerable future for themselves and their children unless each resolves to make it up to the other and give the children real devotion. This is really so simple a case that Belle and Fred should be able to understand it without outside help.

Fred wronged Belle in trying to break up her first marriage, and Belle wronged Fred in using him to vent her bitterness against an errant husband. They now can choose between getting deeper into the complexities of unhappiness or making a determined effort to live down the sordid past by helping each other with forgiveness and love. They do not have an easy task, so they must try hard.

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Reformatory Inmates Form 'Fathers Club'

Ionia, Mich.—(U.P.)—Michigan reformatory inmates, who have donated nearly 10,000 pints of blood to the Red Cross during the last five years, have undertaken another charitable project.

A Foster Fathers' club has been formed at the big prison and so far nearly 700 of the reformatory's 1,300 inmates have donated more than \$500 for the support of an underprivileged child overseas.

Money donated by inmates will be sent to the Foster Parents Division of War Children, Inc., in New York. The prisoners hope to learn the name of the child or children they are supporting, and "perhaps it will be possible to show our parental status by corresponding with the child," the prison newspaper said.
