'New Look' Highway Signs Find Favor

Los Angeles — (U.P.) — California's highway direction signs have a new look which is expected to spread to other parts of the country. The new look aims at eliminating that awful mistake of going the wrong way because you thought the arrow on the highway sign pointed that way. Psychologists working with the Los Angeles Institute of Transportation and Traffic Engineering learned that motorists often take the wrong road because they have a hard time separating directions while in a moving vehicle. To eliminate the misdirection, the institute suggested adding a heavy black line to the sign. The line separates place names in one direction from place names in the opposite direction. The heavy line prevents skipping from one group to the other. Also eliminated are all four-place name signs. The psychologists tested 80 persons and learned that signs with three place names caused significantly fewer errors than those with four.

Women Pastors Win Equal Rights in Church

Minneapolis, Minn. — (U.P.) — Women pastors won equal clergy rights with men at the general conference of the Methodist church Friday by a vote of 389-279 after a heated three-hour debate. The women clergymen were accorded full voting rights in the church and the right to appointment following ordination by delegates to the quadrennial conference.

Administration Asked To Follow Up Mission

Evansville, Ind. — (U.P.) — Sen. Estes Kefauver called on the administration Friday night to "follow up" the Hammarskjold mission to the Middle East with economic aid to the Arab nations and arms to Israel. Kefauver commented on the peace mission to the Middle East by U. N. Secretary-General Dag Hammarskjold before boarding a plane at Jacksonville, Fla., Friday night to fly to Indiana where he will continue his campaign for the Democratic presidential nomination.

Air Passenger Service Starts To Moscow

Buenos Aires — (U.P.) — Direct air passenger service has been established between Buenos Aires and Moscow for the first time, it was announced Friday. The local Scandinavian Airways System office said the service was made possible through an agreement reached between the SAS and Russia's state airline.

Tarentum, Pa. — (U.P.) — Two teenage boys who wandered for nearly 24 hours in a vast coal mine pledged Saturday they will "never go in a mine or play hockey again."

Joseph Pitkevich, 16, and Paul Crawford, 15, were rescued Friday after they entered the Allegheny Coal and Coke Co. mine and became separated from four other hockey-playing companions from Har - Brack High school.

The search for the two boys began Thursday night after they failed to return to the mine entrance where their four companions waited. Parents and neighbors kept an all-night vigil while rescuers made a foot-by-foot search of 10 miles of winding tunnels.

Delinquent Taxpayer Takes Care in Payment

Wichita, Kan. — (U.P.) — One of Uncle Sam's delinquent taxpayers proved to be careful as well as contrite.

With an unsigned letter received at the U. S. District Internal Revenue office were ten \$100 bills. Postmarked Kansas City, Mo., the envelope contained the old, worn currency and a hand-lettered note, which said:

"I want to get right with you and God. Please save serial numbers I have." Gus Koehler, the office director, said the sender undoubtedly wanted to make sure the payment could be proved should the need ever arise.

Didn't Make Vaccine

London — (U.P.) — The Russians finally admitted Saturday that the United States beat them to the draw on something—an effective polio vaccine.

Radio Moscow broadcast an interview with Prof. Mikhail Chumakov, head of the Soviet Institute for the Study of Polio. "We are convinced that it is an effective vaccine and we, too, are going to produce it here in the Soviet Union," he said.

Navy Seaplanes Being Towed to Hawaii Port

Honolulu — (U.P.) — Two Navy seaplanes which ditched on the open sea when they ran low on fuel were being towed into port at Hilo, Hawaii, Saturday. The planes, each carrying a crew of nine, ditched 40 and 120 miles east of Hilo, respectively, yesterday after a losing battle with strong headwinds near the end of a 14-hour flight from San Diego to Barber's Point Naval Air Station here.

Permits Issued for Two Nuclear Plants

Washington — (U.P.) — Private industry will begin actual construction this year on its first two large-scale nuclear plants to provide electricity for commercial use.

Consolidated Edison Co., New York, and Commonwealth Edison Co., Chicago, made its plans public after receiving permits Friday from the Atomic Energy Commission.

Consolidated Edison said it expects to break ground this fall for a \$55 million atomic power plant in Westchester county. Its atomic reactor should begin generating electricity in 1960. H. R. Searing, chairman of the board and chief executive of the company, said "With the permit in hand, we will place orders for the turbine and electrical equipment, pieces of apparatus which will take a considerable time to build."

Hearings Start on Judicial Nomination

Washington — (U.P.) — A Senate Judiciary subcommittee opened long-stalled hearings Saturday on the judicial nomination of Solicitor General Simon E. Sobeloff, winner of the Supreme Court school integration decision. President Eisenhower sent the nomination of the Baltimore lawyer to the U. S. Circuit Court for the second time Jan. 12. The nomination remained in a Judiciary Committee pigeonhole until the hearing yesterday morning.

Scripps-Howard Buys Cincinnati Paper

Cincinnati — (U.P.) — Roger H. Feger, publisher of the Cincinnati Enquirer, said Friday that Scripps-Howard now owns a controlling interest in the newspaper.

Scripps-Howard now, in addition to complete ownership of the Post, owns a controlling interest in the Enquirer but the two papers will operate independently and competitively as they operated prior to Scripps-Howard's acquisition of the major stock interest in the Cincinnati Enquirer, Inc." he added.

Feger said he had met in New York with Roy W. Howard, chairman; Jack Howard, president; Mark Ferree, executive vice president of the Scripps-Howard newspapers; and Charles E. Scripps, chairman of the E. W. Scripps Co. He said their meeting was "entirely satisfactory and most encouraging."

Camp Pendleton, Calif. — (U.P.) — "Hazing" of recruits was banned Saturday at this Marine training camp on orders of Maj. Gen. Joseph McQueen, base commander.

The order was issued after McQueen's return Friday from a Washington conference with Gen. Randolph Pate, Marine Corps commandant, on the drowning of six trainees at Paris Island, S. C.

McQueen also said 34 additional officers and 116 noncoms had been assigned to the recruit depot to provide "closer inspection."
