The exhibit opened May 5 at Carnegie institute, Pittsburgh, under auspices of Scholastic Magazines the awards section of the magazines has announced.

The students are Miss Betty Jamieson and Ron Wisdom, and both paintings are done in oils. Their entries first were shown at the Oregon Regional Scholastic Awards exhibition sponsored by Lipman Wolfe and company, Portland.
