

# Yanks Whip Chicago In Pair To Up Lead; Cincinnatians Climb

The New York Yankees are up to an old trick that pays off in pennants — they're knocking off the key contenders themselves.

The Yankees, who claim they started the "do it yourself" fad 20 years ago, showed the season's largest crowd yesterday why they're the perennial American League champions by handing the Chicago White Sox a pair of 4-0 setbacks.

In the process, the Yankees extended their first-place lead to 2½ games and the White Sox' string of scoreless innings to 20. It was the first meeting of the season between the flag rivals and the 49,016 fans saw the Yankees completely outclass the White Sox. Earlier in the season, the Yankees took four of five games from the pennant-minded Boston Red Sox and now they're pointing for the Cleveland Indians.

Ed (Whitey) Ford breezed to his fourth straight victory in the first game and then south-paw Rip Coleman and veteran relief specialist Jim Konstanty collaborated in another eight-hit performance in the nightcap. The shutouts were the first by Yankee pitchers this year.

Yogi Berra hit his eighth homer and Hank Bauer his sixth to spark the Yankees' 12-hit attack in the first game while shortstop Gil McDougald walloped a key second-inning triple in the second game. Jack Harshman and Harry Byrd suffered the defeats for the White Sox, who have lost five of their last six games to drop back to the .500 mark.

The Kansas City Athletics pounded out 29 hits to beat the Washington Senators, 10-7 and 13-3, and the Baltimore Orioles downed the Detroit Tigers, 6-2 and 4-3, in other AL games. Cleveland at Boston was rained out.

In the National league, those hard-hitting Cincinnati Redlegs climbed to within 20 points of first place when they clubbed the Philadelphia Phillies, 10-2 and 11-9.

The Redlegs hit five round-trippers Sunday, Ted Kluszewski and Gus Bell homering in each game and Frank Robinson walloping a homer, triple and double in the first game. The hapless Phillies now have dropped five straight and nine of their last 11.

## Bailey Met By Throng At Eugene

Eugene — (U.P.) — More than 2,000 persons braved a driving rain last night to welcome Jim Bailey, the University of Oregon junior from Australia, who astonished the sports world Saturday by beating John Landy in the fastest mile ever run on U.S. soil.

Bailey's time was 3:58.6. He was just ahead of his fellow countryman who finished in 3:58.7.

The 26-year-old Bailey wasted little time in pomp and ceremony. Both he and teammate Bill Dellinger worked out in Los Angeles yesterday in preparation for the Northern division meet next week in Eugene. Bailey will run the 880 and mile and Dellinger the mile and two-mile.

"I just ran the best I knew how and it turned out that way," Bailey said.

San Francisco — (U.P.) — John Landy, who has cracked the millers' four minute barrier five times in his sparkling career, expects to do it again this week at the Fresno Relays and will be "awfully surprised" if he doesn't.

"If I could do it in Los Angeles in 3:58.7 last Saturday why shouldn't I do it again at Fresno?" the candid schoolmaster from Australia asked. "It's not that I feel as if I were at a peak or anything like that. But when you go under four minutes one week it seems possible that you can do it the next."

The Landy-Bailey duel overshadowed other track events in the Far West last week end, but for the record, here are results of some of the more important meets:

Stanford ran off with the 61st renewal of the Big Game track meet, defeating California, 85 to 46.

At Salt Lake City, the Air Force's Parry O'Brien broke the world's outdoor record for the shotput with a heave of 61 feet 1 inch in the annual intermountain AAT track and field meet.
