

## Driver Who Hit Train With Truck May Face Charges

Waukesha, Wis. — (U.P.) — Authorities debated today whether to bring charges against a driver who smashed his truck into a special train carrying 1000 baseball bound school children, injuring more than 100 persons.

The truck driver, Gordon Hinkley, 39, Wales, Wis., was the most seriously injured victim yesterday. He was pried loose from his smashed cab suffering from fractures of both legs and the left hand.

**Passed Other Trucks**

Witnesses said he sped his truck past six other trucks, through the crossing signals, and into the 16-car Milwaukee Road diesel train carrying 1000 Portage, Wis., children to a game between the Milwaukee Braves and the Brooklyn Dodgers.

The train, smashed like a tin can between the engine and the first coach, wobbled onwards for two or three blocks until 10 cars toppled off the tracks near the Duplainville, Wis., railroad station.

**No Children Killed**

Screaming children flew through the air. Some of them hurtled through smashed windows. Miraculously, none was killed.

Deputy Sheriff Pete Roelands tried to question Hinkley last night at Waukesha Memorial hospital. But he was "still groggy from anesthesia and we were not able to get much of a statement from him," he said.

There were 37 persons hospitalized today here and at Milwaukee. Two-third of the injured were school children in the seventh and eighth grades. The rest were teachers or parents.

## Sample Ballots for Primary Available at Clerk's Office

Sample ballots for the primary election Friday, May 18, have been printed and are now available at the county clerk's office in the courthouse.

There are three ballots available, Republican, Democratic and non-partisan for judicial offices. The non-partisan ballot will go to all voters, but Republican ballots will go only to Republican voters, and Democratic ballots to Democratic voters. Those who are registered as independents, or with parties other than the two principal ones, will not receive the major primary ballots.

Voters throughout the county will vote for justice of the supreme court, position No. 5. The candidates are Hall S. Lusk, the incumbent, a veteran member of the court, and L. B. (Sandy) Sandblast, an attorney. Both are from Multnomah county.

**District Judgeship**

Also up for county-wide vote will be the Jackson county district judgeship. Rawles Moore is the incumbent. The ballot also bears the name of O. Hilding Bengtson, although he has withdrawn his candidacy, and asked voters to cast their ballots for Judge Moore.

In the Ashland justice of the peace district, voters will decide between three candidates for that office, Nellie W. Burns, the incumbent, Ida B. George, and L. Peers Wilmetts.

While the judicial voting is being conducted simultaneously with the primary nominating election, the vote May 18 will decide the race.

The Democratic ballot is the shorter of the two party ballots. It contains the following candidates and offices:

## Tell the Truth, Stevenson Urges

San Jose, Calif. — (U.P.) — Adlai E. Stevenson has asked the Eisenhower administration to "stop treating the American people like children who must be shielded from every fact of life."

Stevenson told an outdoor barbecue attended by 800 persons last night that there is "mistrust in the air, a feeling of not being told about the situation at home and abroad."

He said the people of the United States were not being told the truth about foreign affairs and all controversial domestic issues.

Stevenson is currently campaigning in California in a bid to win this state's 68 votes in the Democratic National Convention. The California primary is June 5.

Today he speaks in Milpitas, Mountain View, Palo Alto, Hayward, Alameda, Berkeley, Albany and El Cerrito he will make a major address at Richmond Civic Auditorium tonight, discussing social security. He will spend the night in San Francisco.

Earlier yesterday in Monterey, Stevenson lampooned Secretary of State John Foster Dulles as the administration's "un-guided missile." He said Dulles

## Stevenson Slates Return To Oregon

Portland — (U.P.) — Adlai Stevenson is scheduled to return to Oregon late Sunday afternoon to continue his campaign to capture Oregon's 16 Democratic convention votes. Both he and Sen. Estes Kefauver have active campaigns organized in the state for write-in votes in the May 18 primary.

The first official event on Stevenson's schedule in Oregon will be an informal coffee and desert meeting at the Jefferson high school cafeteria in Portland from 7 p.m. to 9 p.m. Sunday evening.

Stevenson will arrive in Oregon earlier than had been previously planned but has been forced to eliminate two nights from the end of his Oregon campaign. The schedule changes were brought about by the 1952 nominee's hurried trip east to attend funeral services for Sen. Alben Barkley.

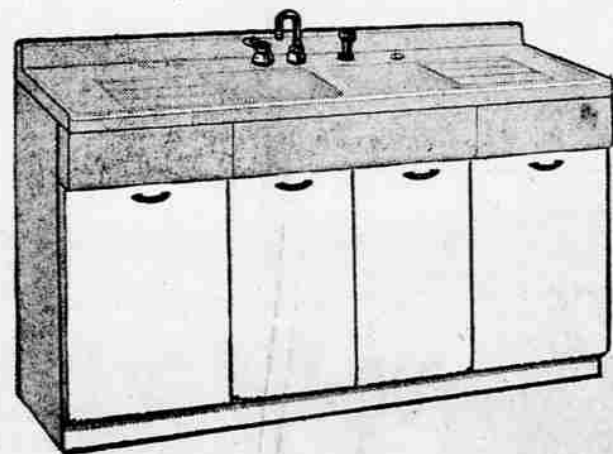

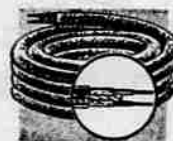

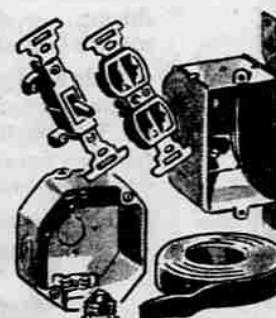
