## Number of Nation's Employed Sets Record

Washington, (U.P.)—The number of employed persons rose to 63,900,000 last month, a new April record.

The government also reported that unemployment started a springtime decline.

Commerce and Labor department figures showed that total civilian employment increased by 912,000 from March to April, mainly because of a spurt in farm employment.

The unemployed total for April was 2,564,000, a decline of 270,000 from March. The department reported, however, that unemployment among factory workers "remained at or above winter levels" instead of declining as usual in April.

## Too Much Faith Seen in Russian Peace Campaign

Washington—(U.P.)—The United States is afraid some of its North Atlantic treaty allies are putting too much faith in Russia's sweet talking peace campaign.

Some officials fear certain NATO partners may try to reduce military draft periods for their young men or cut their defense spending. Either move could hurt the effectiveness of the NATO pact, the West's bulwark against the threat of Soviet aggression.

The difference between U. S. and some other NATO allies' estimates of new Russian peace tactics was emphasized at last week's NATO council meeting in Paris.

## Dulles To Report

Secretary of State John Foster Dulles, who returned from the meeting yesterday, reports on the session tonight at about 5:30 p.m. (PST) in a nationwide radio address.

Dulles is expected to tell his audience about American-sponsored plans to create within the NATO framework at a high level council to assure Western unity in the cold war. The council would deal with any problems which tends to disturb unity of the Atlantic allies.

**Nothing Has Happened**  
At present, Dulles apparently does not feel the difference in the U. S. attitude and that of some of its allies toward the new Russian tactics is serious enough to disturb NATO unity. He said on arrival from Paris that the 15 NATO foreign ministers agreed "nothing has happened" in relations with Russia that "has led us to believe that we can safely drop our guard."

But it was learned that some of our allies believe the danger from Russia has decreased more than Dulles thinks it has. Some of the allies, including France, want to put more faith than the United States thinks wise in recent Russian "peace" statements and internal changes.

## French Troops Blast Algerian Guerrillas

Algiers—(U.P.)—Angry French troops blasted a guerrilla nest in the hills of Northwest Algeria today, boosting casualties of two days of bitter battle to more than 250 dead.

Helicopter-borne French soldiers used mortars to pin down some 200 guerrillas cowered in a hill-top sheepfold until fighter planes arrived to smash the position with bombs and rockets.

More than 100 Arabs, including some Moroccans, were killed and 67 were taken prisoner in the battle.

The cornered guerrillas were remnants of bands numbering about 2500 which killed 54 persons yesterday in the bloodiest raids of the 18-month reign of terror in Algeria. The Arabs' victims included 17 European residents, 13 men, three women and a child, and 37 loyal natives.

The guerrillas burned out 47 farms in Oran province and kidnapped a European girl and 20 natives.
