Washington—Secretary of State John Foster Dulles, on his return from a North Atlantic Treaty Organization meeting in Paris: "It was recognized that the unity of the Atlantic community must be further developed if it is to surmount the shifting tactics of international Communism and if it is to serve the needs of this and coming generations."

New York—Broadway producer Kermit Bloomgarden, on being told his current success "The Diary of Anne Frank" won the Pulitzer Prize: "I am the most happy fella."

Washington—Sen. Mike Mansfield (D-Mont.) on the victory in Texas of Sen. Lyndon B. Johnson over Gov. Allan Shivers for control of the state delegation to the Democratic National convention: "It's good news for the unity and future of the Democratic party."

Cairo—Carroll Pederson, to the Egyptian girl he traveled 8,000 miles to marry, at the great pyramid of Cheops: "This pyramid is a symbol of our romance. Just as it has stood thousands of years, so will our love be permanent."

Mau Mau Campaign Being Mopped Up

London—(U.P.)—Britain's campaign against the Mau Mau terrorists in the Kenya colony is in the "mopping up" stage, according to the colony's governor, Evelyn Baring.

Baring arrived here yesterday to discuss with Colonial Secretary Alan Lennox-Boyd security arrangements for the forthcoming visit of Princess Margaret to Kenya.

He said the fact that the princess will visit Kenya is proof that the Mau Mau troubles are just about over.

"It is still a military operation, but it is a mopping up operation," Baring said. "The worst is very much over. Most of our efforts now are turned towards peaceful development."

He said Kenya's most acute problem now is rehabilitating the Kiyuya tribesmen and women who formerly were terrorists.

Gettysburg, Pa.—(U.P.)—Backstairs at the Gettysburg White House:

David Eisenhower is only eight years old but is one of the most composed fellows around.

Last Saturday, out at the local country club, the President's grandson was the center of attention by reporters and photographers as he took a long golf lesson from Dick Sleichter, the club pro.

A lot of touring professionals would have blown sky high, what with cameras at their feet and reporters remarking quite audibly about the quality of the golf.

But young David was utterly unperturbed and hit practice shots with his pint-sized club with a degree of concentration his grandfather could use on occasion when he is playing golf.

Sleichter wanted to give David a yellow cap with the club emblem on it.

David was most happy to receive the gift, but he asked quite carefully before accepting it: "Has this been bought?"

Assured that it was a personal gift from the pro, David clamped the cap on his head and went about his golf.

It is a good bet that David's mother, Mrs. John Eisenhower, will have something to say to her distinguished in-laws about the public attention paid to the boy in Gettysburg this week-end.

Barbara Eisenhower is a level-headed young Army wife who has very fixed beliefs that too many flashbulbs and pictures might give David a somewhat warped idea of his own importance.

The President, on the other hand, is about as doting as a grandfather can be. David looks like him, talks like him, and with the help of a few more golf lessons, probably will be able to play golf like him.
