

Jake Lasby Spurs Chiefs In 5-4 Nod

Wenatchee Manager Edo Vanni, a pretty fair hitter in his day, doesn't take his turn at the plate any more but he's still batting 1.000 as a prophet.

"This rookie, Jake Lasby, will do some hitting for us," Vanni declared when the Chiefs were in spring training.

Lasby made his boss look good last night when his stick-work played a big part in Wenatchee's 5-4 triumph over Salem.

The rookie catcher came up in the second with one runner aboard and blasted one out of the park for two of Wenatchee's runs.

In the ninth, Lasby got another chance and again came through. With the bases loaded, he dunked a single just beyond the reach of the infield to drive in the winning run.

Gene Shortridge went the route for the Chiefs to pick up his second victory of the year.

Eugene collected 18 hits off four Spokane hurlers and posted an easy 15-9 decision over the Indians. The Emeralds got five runs in the first frame on five hits and two errors and Spokane was never in it after that.

The game was marred by 25 walks. Bob Martin picked up the decision.

The Tri-City-Lewiston game was called because of rain and those two teams will try to make up ground tonight with a doubleheader.

Baker Picked Over Holman

Miami Beach — (U.P.) — Mus-tachioed Bob Baker is an 8-5 favorite to whip John Holman in tonight's 12-round heavy-weight bout at the Miami Beach auditorium.

Baker, third-ranked in the heavyweight standings, is as slow on his feet as Holman, but possesses speedier hands. His career has been hampered several times when he fractured one or the other of his fists, but he hasn't had any trouble lately.

Holman of Chicago has concentrated on improving his speed during a grueling training grind. His promised to show an expected full house of 3,000 "the fastest Holman you've ever seen."

WILLIAMS HAS SECOND PLACE TIE IN OREGON OPEN; MASON IN FRONT

Portland — (U.P.) — Bunny Mason, professional at Salem Golf club, shot a five-under-par 67 yesterday to lead the field at the midway point in the Oregon Open at Eastmoreland golf course here.

Mason put together a 34 and a 33 yesterday to go with his opening round card of 69 to take a two stroke lead on the field with a 136.

Going into today's final 36 hole playoffs, 16 players are under par for the 36 holes played.

First round leader Ed Hogan of Riverside dropped into a tie with Al Williams, Medford, after

yesterday's par-busting display. Hogan carded a 71 yesterday while Williams toured the course in 70 for 138. Both are two strokes off the pace at the midway mark.

Ed Oldfield, Roseburg, stood solidly in fourth spot, coming home with a 69 yesterday to go along with his opening round 70.

George Harrington, Rogue Valley Country club, Medford, has a two-day card of 76-75 in the Oregon Golf open. Harry Millette, also of Rogue Valley, has an 80-74—154, and Clayton Lewis, Medford, 79-79—158.

Release of 175,000 Fish Scheduled for Main Rogue

Portland — Eager Ike Walton will have nearly 3,000,000 additional catchable size fish to angle for this summer. That's the number game commission hatcheries have on hand for release in Oregon lakes and streams during the 1956 angling season.

Legal sized fish include rainbows, cut-throats, eastern brooktrout, and lake trout. In addition, steelhead, silver and chinook salmon will also be released at six to eight inches and undoubtedly some of these will be taken by anglers.

According to Reino Koski, chief of liberations, allocation of these fish has been made for all watersheds, and tank trucks are now rolling to release these fish in the lakes and streams for the angler's taking.

The largest allocations were made for the heavily fished waters of the northwest region where approximately 1,276,000 are scheduled for release. The popular McKenzie will receive a grand total of 109,000 rainbow trout, the second largest allocation for any stream in the state. The Clarmamas is scheduled for plantings of 96,000 rainbows, the Willamette 75,000, and the Santiam 62,000. A release of 88,000 steelhead is slated for the Sandy river.

Along the coast, the Alsea and Siletz rivers will receive a combined total of 64,500 legal fish, most of which will be steelhead and silver salmon.

Heavy Lake Plantings
Lakes in the northwest region scheduled to receive heavy plantings include Detroit and Lookout Point reservoirs, 50,000 each; Dorena reservoir, 30,000; and Dexter reservoir, 22,000, all of which will be rainbow trout.

The very popular central region is second on the list with 681,000 legal fish on the release schedule. To receive the heaviest plantings of any stream in the state will be the heavily fished Deschutes river. A total of 115,000 legal rainbows are scheduled for release during the summer and 40,000 steelhead trout. The Metolius will receive 47,000 fish of which 10,000 will be steelhead and the remainder rainbows.

Lakes in the area to receive heavy plantings include Odell, 50,000 lake trout and 19,000 rainbows; Cultus, 25,000 lake trout and 8,500 rainbows; and Suttle, 30,000 of which 15,000 will be steelhead and the remainder rainbows.

Third on the list will be the waters of the southwest region where 620,000 legal fish will be released. The main Rogue will receive the heaviest plantings in this area where 175,000 are on the schedule. Of this number 75,000 will be silver salmon and 25,000 chinooks. The remainder are mainly rainbow trout. The main, north, and south forks of the Umpqua will also receive heavy plantings.

A total of 161,000 legal fish are scheduled for the Umpqua of which 75,000 will be chinook salmon and 25,000 silver salmon. The Tenmile lake system will be stocked with 26,000 legal fish, 10,000 of which will be silver

salmon.

50,000 for Wallowa
Wallowa lake will get the heaviest load in the northwest region where 50,000 trout are on the release schedule. Releases include 25,000 rainbows and 25,000 lake trout. Plantings of 32,000 rainbow are scheduled for the John Day river and its forks, and the Umatilla river will receive 20,000 rainbows. Total allocation of legal sized trout for the northeast area will be 267,000.

Low man on the totem pole is the sparsely watered area of southeast Oregon where 128,000 legal fish will be released. The Malheur river will receive 15,500 rainbow trout for the heaviest plantings of any stream in the southeast. Another 10,000 rainbows are scheduled for the Owyhee river, 8,000 for the Donner and Blitzen rivers, and the popular Fish lake will receive 10,000 legal rainbows.

According to Reino Koski, practically all of the popular fishing streams and many lakes will get plantings of legal trout during the summer. The total number of trout, steelhead, and salmon—including fry, fingerlings, and legal—to be released from game commission hatcheries during 1956 will be close to 13,000,000.

Fresno Foresees Record Turnout

Fresno, Calif. — (U.P.) — Meet officials predicted today an all-time record crowd will turn out Saturday at the 30th annual West Coast Relays to watch John Landy take another crack at his world mile mark.

"With standing room," a relays spokesman said, "we are figuring on a crowd of 16,000. We are already sold out except for some one dollar seats."

Landy, sensational Australian who holds the mile record at 3:58 flat, was billed as the headliner. But he will have plenty of competition in the spotlight.

Agostini To Run
Mike Agostini, winged-foot Jamaican attending Fresno State, heads the list of 28 entries in the 100-yard dash. Agostini only last Saturday was checked in 9.3 to unofficially tie the world record.

Three entries in the high jump have bettered 6-foot, 9-inches this year. But the crowd will have its eyes on towering Bill Russell, All-America basketball player, who has cleared 6-foot-8 even though he has been working out for only a few weeks.

BYRNE SIDELINED

New York — (U.P.) — New York Yankee Pitcher Tommy Byrne, who was supposed to start against the Cleveland Indians Tuesday, will be out of action for several days because of a heavy cough. The 36-year-old lefthander spent Tuesday in the hospital and more than likely will miss his next start.
