

Spahn Throws Three-Hitter As Braves Club Pittsburgh

Manager Charley Grimm of the Milwaukee Braves felt 10 years younger today because he's convinced that Warren Spahn is growing old gracefully.

Grimm had plenty of cause for worry over Spahn's 5.40 earned run average in three early appearances this year but the 35-year-old southpaw demonstrated Tuesday night that he's still a star pitcher with a three-hitter that gave the Braves a 5-0 triumph over the Pittsburgh Pirates. The win enabled the Braves to run their winning streak to four games and hold first place.

The shutout was the 35th of Spahn's career—highest among active major league pitchers—and moved him a step closer to a cherished goal. It was the 184th triumph of his career, leaving him 16 shy of becoming the only active pitcher in the NL with 200 victories.

Faces 31 Batters
Spahn walked only one batter and struck out 10 as he breezed to his first win of the year behind a six-hit attack that included home runs by Joe Adcock, Del Crandall and Bobby Thomson. The Milwaukee outfield had only one putout as Spahn faced only 31 batters and pitched no-hit ball after the third inning. Bob Friend suffered his second setback.

The St. Louis Cardinals, meanwhile, took over second place when they routed Robin Roberts and beat the Philadelphia Phillies, 9-1. The Cincinnati Reds fell to third place when they bowed to the New York Giants, 5-4, and the Brooklyn Dodgers beat the Chicago Cubs 6-0, in other NL games.

The hard-hitting Cardinals chased Roberts in a five-run third-inning uprising to score their fifth win in six games behind a four-hitter by Willard Schmidt and Larry Jackson. Rookie Hal Smith and Rip Reeseki homered and Stan Musial had a triple and a double for the big blows in St. Louis 10-hit assault.

Don Liddle's ninth inning relief aid preserved Jim Hearn's second win of the year as the Giants ended the Redlegs' four-game winning streak. Willie Mays had two hits and ran wild on the bases for the Giants, who have been involved in 11 one-run decisions in 18 games. They've won six.

Don Newcombe turned in a three-hitter for his fourth victory, enabling the world champion Dodgers to break a three-game losing skid. Gil Hodges hit a three-run homer and a run-scoring single for the Dodgers, whose last three victories have been scored by Newcombe.

Seven Out of Eight
In the American league, the New York Yankees made it seven out of eight over their three key rivals when they shaded the Cleveland Indians, 4-3, in the opener on a three-game series. Mickey Mantle, Elston Howard and Hank Bauer homered and Johnny Kuck scattered 10 hits for the Yankees.

George Zuverink relieved for the fourth straight game and 13th time this season as the Baltimore Orioles beat the Kansas City Athletics, 7-4, and entered the first division for the first time in the franchise's history. The Orioles salted it away with a five-run first-inning marked by Gus Triandos' two-run double and a two-run single by Willie Miranda.

The Detroit Tigers sent 13 men to the plate in an eight-run fifth-inning to wallop the Washington Senators, 14-6, and Dick Gernert singled home the winning run in the 13th inning to give the Red Sox a 4-3 verdict over the White Sox. Hector Brown won his first game for the Orioles and rookie Dave Sisler his second for the Red Sox.

The Black Tornado is tied for one other best, Grants Pass has two top marks and Klamath Falls one and a tie for one. While the A-1s are competing at Klamath the A-2s and Bs will be fighting for honors in simultaneous meets on the Southern Oregon college field at Ashland. Among the A-2s southern division schools are entering with the better marks in seven events.

Pheasants Freed By Game Farms

Portland — Spring releases of adult pheasants from the game commission's upland game bird farms have now been completed according to Vic Masson, chief of game bird management. Adult breeder pheasants, purposely held over the winter at the E. E. Wilson game farm, totalling 3,798 birds. These were released in western Oregon, with 2,982 released in the north-west region, and 816 released in the southwest region.

A total of 315 pheasants was released from the Ontario game farm into the southeast region. These were surplus birds from the breeding stock held at the farm each year.

The main breeding stock numbering 2,000 birds at the E. E. Wilson game farm and 1,600 birds at the Ontario plant will be released in late May or early June as soon as sufficient eggs are gathered for this year's production. These birds will nest and lay a short clutch of eggs this year adding substantially to the wild bird production.

Total production of pheasants for 1956 is set at 13,000 at the E. E. Wilson game farm and 10,000 at the Ontario game farm.

Landy Name Helps Track Financially

San Francisco — (U.P.) — The magic of John Landy's name and his ability to run the mile in four minutes or less have combined to spell box office success for track and field for the first time on the West Coast.

The Southern California-UCLA meet at Los Angeles on Saturday probably would have drawn about 5,000 fans without Landy. With him, more than 38,000 went through the turnstiles.

Wilbur Jones, UCLA athletic director, watched the Landy race on television at the Sir Francis Drake hotel here during the Pacific Coast conference meeting over the week-end.

Like Grid Crowd

"Wow! Look at that crowd," he yowled when the television showed one side of the huge Los Angeles coliseum filled. "Looks like a crowd for a football game."

There is more of the same to come for the West Coast Relays this Saturday at Fresno.

The stands there hold only 15,000 fans — and usually the night crowd for the oldest event of its kind in the West is about 12,000 to 13,000.

The idea to bring Landy to this country to pep up interest in Australia and the 1956 Olympic Games there in December was thought up by a bright young man named Pete Roselle, who works for Qantas Airlines.

On a trip to Australia, Roselle met Landy and decided it would be a fine thing for sports in U.S. for the young school teacher to run in this country.

Nearly Killed Project

Of course, Dan Ferris of the AAU nearly killed the project completely when he threatened to make Landy a professional because Roselle hadn't gone through the proper channels in making the suggestion.

But after things were straightened out, every track and field filbert, plus a lot who never went near a meet, suddenly became conscious of the world's greatest miler.

The only sad thing about Landy's appearances has been the fact that the top college coaches in the West have refused to let their ace milers run against the Australian. Only Coach Bill Bowerman of Oregon who sent down Australian Jim Bailey to beat Landy came through. Jim Delaney of Villanova is from the East.

The top milers at UCLA and USC were refused permission to compete against the world's greatest artist at that distance.

L-C Pioneer Director Seeks Part-Time Coach
