The Seattle Rainiers tightened the Pacific Coast League flag race last night by turning the screws on the Los Angeles Angels.

The Rainiers called on their old mechanic, Elmer Singleton, who gave the Angels plenty of hits, but no runs. The Rainiers thereby got a 3-0 decision and moved to within a game of the top while Sacramento got to within a half game by sitting out the rain in Hollywood.

Len Neal led Vancouver to a 5-4 win over Portland and the San Diego Padres beat San Francisco 5-4.

Singleton gave up a single hit in each of the first six innings and two in the ninth but allowed only one Angel past second base. Steve Bilko upped his fat, league-leading batting average, how-

ever, by getting three hits in four trips.

Powerful Start

Carmen Mauro, in the starting lineup for the first time this season, led off the sixth with a home run to give Singleton a two run lead after the Rainiers scored the first tally in the second.

Seattle got another single one for Singleton in the sixth. Neal accounted for three of the five Vancouver runs with a pair of homers and helped chase the winner home in the top of the ninth with a single.

Neal homered in the second with none on and again in the fourth with a mate aboard. But the Mounties' George Bamberger could not hold his four-run lead and the Beavers tied it up with three in the sixth and one in the seventh. Then in the ninth a walk, a single by Neal and a run-producing pinch hit single by Don Leppert settled the game.

The loser was Ray Shore, who came on in the sixth.

Costly Walks

R. G. Smith, San Francisco southpaw, walked only two men in the game with San Diego, but both walks came with the bases full and cost him a victory.

He walked in two of the three tallies the Padres scored in the second and gave up a two-run homer to Earl Rapp in the third. Rapp's first homer of the season.

Olympic Officials Says People Would Be Less Critical of AAU If They Knew All Facts Involved

Chicago — (U.P.) — If people knew all the facts, they wouldn't be so critical of the AAU for barring track star Wes Santee and other athletes, T. Nelson Metcalf said today.

Metcalf, a U. S. Olympic official since 1932, retired in June after 23 years as the University of Chicago's athletic director. He succeeded Alonzo A. Stagg in the post in 1933.

"The only shame of the Santee case," Metcalf said, "is that the AAU didn't catch up with a few other outstanding fellows who did the same thing in years past."

"The amateur rules are all right," he said. "The fault lies with a lot of people besides athletes. Track meet promoters who paid big money to star athletes and AAU officials who were lax are fully as much to blame."

Fun Of Playing

Metcalf, who has coached through winning and lean years, said "we can't afford to forget the Olympic ideal of amateur sports. They are for the fun of playing, for the glory of sport itself, and not for the material gain an athlete can get out of it."

He said it was natural for fans to make a hero out of Santee. But Metcalf said he hasn't met a person yet who didn't

Portland — Siuslaw and Rogue river access will be the feature items for discussion at the game commission's meeting Friday, May 11, it was announced today. Another important access point up for reconsideration is the Depoe Bay boat hoist, previously approved by the commission. The Army Engineers have reported that the sea wall at the site is unstable which prohibits the installation of the hoist under the present plans. The feasibility of installing the boat hoist to steel piling will be considered by the commission.

Routine business matters are the remaining items on the agenda which includes consideration of bids for concrete ponds and pipeline at the Wallowa hatchery and a house and machine shed for the Wenaha management area.
