

Cattlemen Ponder Establishment of Beef Commission

Bend — The Oregon Cattlemen's association winds up its annual three-day state convocation here today with the selection of officers one of the major issues before the members.

The cattlemen also were to consider a proposal to establish a beef commission.

Members yesterday acted on several resolutions and heard several major speeches from governmental and livestock leaders.

Dan Thornton, ex-governor of Colorado and himself an operator of a large beef cattle ranch, told the group that he felt the cattle industry should remain free of government control and that there was every reason to believe that cattlemen were capable of running their own business.

Roll with Punches

Gov. Elmo Smith told the group that Oregon cattlemen have learned to "roll with the punches" in the past and despite a 50 per cent cut in the past five years they still can look to a future that justifies confidence and optimism.

He said that although the livestock industry was basically stable and solid "there is a limit to which it can stand adversity and still maintain good health. It is the industry's ability to hang on in bad times and solidify gains in good times that we, as a society, and you, as an industry, must devise a means to protect."

Urges Game Damage Study

Resolutions adopted by the meeting yesterday included: Urging the game commission to study the problem of big game damage to crops and range land and continue the either sex hunting seasons; urging that steps be taken to retain the Pacific International stock show in Portland; and reaffirming its stand against reduction in rail freight rates on west bound dressed meats without a similar reduction on livestock freight rates.

British Submarine Damaged in Collision

Portsmouth, England — (U.P.) — The British submarine Talent was damaged yesterday when it collided with a large merchant ship off the Isle of Wight, the Admiralty announced today. There were no casualties.

The admiralty said the small 1090-ton submarine with 70 men aboard was traveling at periscope depth in poor visibility when it hit the freighter and that it was possible the unidentified freighter did not know what it had hit.

The announcement said the submarine suffered superficial damage to its fin.

Its periscope was bent and the superstructure damaged. The Talent was able to return to the submarine depot at Gosport under its own power.

A sister ship to the Talent, the Truculent, was sunk by the Swedish tanker Divine in the Thames Estuary in 1950 with heavy loss of life. It was salvaged later and scrapped.

Corvallis Cracks Down On Youthful Smokers

Corvallis — (U.P.) — Corvallis is fed up with the spectacle of teen-agers puffing cigarettes in public. The city council has adopted an ordinance prohibiting the practice. Modeled after an unenforced state law, the ordinance would make smoking juveniles and those who sell them tobacco liable for prosecution in municipal court.

Long Distance Phone Connection Slated

Portland — (U.P.) — Officials of the Pacific Telephone & Telegraph Company here announced yesterday that the Federal Communications Commission has approved plans for the company to construct a \$1,100,000 long distance cable linking Baker, Pandleton and Walla Walla, Wash.

Spokesmen said that construction will get under way in July and is scheduled for completion by the year's end.

The company estimates demand for private lines over the route connecting the three cities will increase about 73 per cent in 1957 and the demand before the new facilities are completed will be about 7 per cent more than existing facilities can handle.
