School Health Workshop Is Scheduled at SOC June 11

A school health workshop for elementary and high school teachers, designed for teaching units on Community public health services, will be held June 11-12 at Southern Oregon college.

Both graduate and undergraduate credit will be given. School health services will be the focus for the first week. Relating the services to the curriculum will be considered during the second week when correlating school and community programs, and coordination between health and physical education programs and competitive sports will be discussed.

Leaders in Field
Several leaders in the public health field in Oregon will be in Ashland to serve as resource people and demonstrate specific services. The staff of the Jackson County health department is assisting with the planning and will participate. Miss Dorothy Huskey, health educator, is serving as workshop director.

Each morning there will be information sessions on subjects such as physical examinations, health records, screening by the teacher and the public health nurse, hearing, dental health, vision, communicable disease control, and health department services.

In the afternoon special interest groups will meet to work on specific problems related to individual school programs.

Serving on the planning committee are Mary Ellen Bell, public health nurse; Dorothy Colard, supervisor of public health nursing; Dorothy Huskey, health educator; and Dr. A. E. Merkel, health officer, all from the Jackson County health department.

High School Science Laboratory Needed

Chicago—(U.P.)—Dr. Robert H. Carleton, executive secretary of the National Science Teachers Association, said high school science taught without "challenging laboratory instruction" is fraudulent.

Carleton said many high school administrators and boards of education are lax in "allowing such vital and significant experiences for the country's future scientists to be frittered away by so-called 'demonstration methods' in place of student laboratory work."

Carleton, who spends much of his time observing science teaching throughout the high schools of the country, said adequate scientific equipment is "sadly lacking" in many schools, while others have no laboratory facilities at all.

Science teaching represents but one segment, but a segment of growing importance in the education of all our youth," he said.

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Sales Tax Favored By Pomona Grange
