## Husky Officials Will Talk Over Cherberg Salary

Seattle — (U.P.) — Dr. Henry Schmitz, University of Washington president, said today he would meet with the student-faculty Board of Control in efforts to reach a salary agreement for ousted Football Coach John Cherberg.

The board yesterday turned down a request made earlier by Schmitz that Cherberg be paid a total \$11,000 salary for 1956. The board also voted to stand pat on its original offer of \$6,000 which Cherberg has already rejected.

The school's administration announced earlier that Schmitz' recommendation for full pay would be made a directive if the board did not comply.

"I will meet with the board in the next day or two in an attempt to reach an amicable agreement," Schmitz said. Schmitz has the power to overrule the board.

Cherberg was fired as head coach in January on the heels of a so-called "player rebellion." The Board of Regents verbally agreed to rehire him for 1956 providing he could restore harmony on the squad but Cherberg was later fired by Harvey Cassill, former athletic director.

An aftermath of the rebellion was the disclosure of a downtown "slush fund" administered outside conference regulations which this week resulted in a two-year sports probation and the equivalent of \$53,000 in fines.

## Sacs Idle But Take Lead; Portland Wins

A pop bunt more than 1,000 miles away squeezed the Sacramento Solons back into first place in the Pacific Coast League last night while they were sitting around playing Spit in the Ocean in Hollywood.

The Solons were washed out of their game with the Stars but were waved into the PCL league lead when Jim Moran's bottom of the ninth bunt gave the Seattle Rainiers a 7-6 victory over Los Angeles.

Sacramento, Los Angeles and Seattle wound up on top of the crest with only percentage points separating them.

The other two games were also close with Portland nipping Vancouver 3-2 in 10 innings and San Diego holding off San Francisco 5-4.

Four pitchers saw action for the Angels and three for the Rainiers as the teams saw-sawed through their contest. Two runs in the top of the eighth put the Angels a run up, but the Rainiers got it back in the bottom of the ninth and then filled the bases to set the stage for Moran's squeeze bunt.

Four RBI's Jim Bolger drove in four Angel runs with a three-run homer and a sacrifice fly. Unlucky Ernie Funk went the whole 10-inning route for Vancouver against the Beavers and then was betrayed by an earned run in the first extra frame to receive his sixth loss without a credit mark.

Bob Darnell, who relieved Royce Lint in the ninth got win number two without a loss. First baseman Jim Westlake sent the game into extra innings by hitting a home run with the sacks clear in the top of the ninth when the Beavers were leading 2-1.

## Landy Arrives For Fresno Run; Try Out Track

Fresno, Calif. — (U.P.) — Modest John Landy, the Australian who cracks the once-impossible four-minute barrier nearly every time he runs the mile, landed here today to compete in the West Coast Relays Saturday.

Landy was to get in his working-out on the track at the Ratcliffe Stadium this afternoon. Tonight he will appear at a B'nai B'rith banquet to hand out awards to high school athletes. Then he goes back into training.

"I feel in excellent condition," said the Australian who ran a 3:58.7 mile at Los Angeles last Saturday, only to lose to Oregon's Jim Bailey, who was timed in 3:58.6.

"Now if the weather stays good and the track is as fast as they say it is, there is a possibility I could do even better than I did at Los Angeles—even break my own world record 3:58."

So far, meet Director Flint Hanner is content to let the mile event start with only four men as opposition. These are Ron Delaney of Villanova; Jerome Walters of Los Angeles; Dan Schweikert, former Occidental star of Los Angeles, and Mike Stanley, ex-Yale ace now in the armed forces.

# James, Gustafson Chalk Up Raider Track Records

Ashland — Running without the services of six of its regular point producers, the Southern Oregon college track team was the 87 to 44 victim of Humboldt State at Arcata on Tuesday.

However, the Red Raiders of the Rogue busted one school record and tied another. Outstanding performance of the meet was by Earl James. Running his first 440-yarder of the year, he clipped off the distance in :49.9. The time shattered the :50.8 mark set by Bruce Friend last season. James also knotted the Raider standard of :22.4 in the 220 sprint.

Dick Gustafson, ex-Crater high, was the other record smasher. He won the two mile in 10:38, beating his previous fastest time by 30 seconds. Hollingsworth High Bill Hollingsworth of SOC was the high man of the meet. He won the high jump and pole vault and was second in the shot put for 13 points.

This Friday the Raiders will be at full strength for a meet with Oregon Tech at Ashland. The meet is set for 2 p.m. Southern Oregon trimmed the Owls earlier this year in a three-way struggle at Shasta. OTI has been improving, nevertheless and SOC is not expecting an easy time.

Baseball action with OTI which was to have been last week end is rescheduled for next Monday. One nine inning game will be played at Klamath Falls. A doubleheader previously was planned. The Raider tennis team will go to Humboldt next Tuesday.
