## Employment Up In Coast States

San Francisco (U.P.) — Wage and salary employment, excluding domestic and agricultural workers, increased by 43,600 in the three Pacific Coast states in February to a total of 5,302,500 in mid-March, according to the Department of Labor.

Employment in the three states was higher by 244,700, or almost 5 per cent, than in March of last year.

California employment increased 32,000 from February to a mid-March total of 4,110,200, with gains in manufacturing, construction and trade.

Employment in Oregon was up 4,000 to a mid-March level of 454,100 with construction and trade contributing slightly more than half the gain.

Washington employment, up 7,600 to a March total of 738,200, also was responding to seasonal expansions in construction and trade.

Current-year-ago comparisons were favorable in all three states, California was up 214,700 from March of last year; Oregon, 111,000; and Washington, 18,900.
