Gold Hill—New officers will be installed at a meeting of Gold Hill Parent-Teacher association set for tonight at 8 o'clock in the school gymnasium.

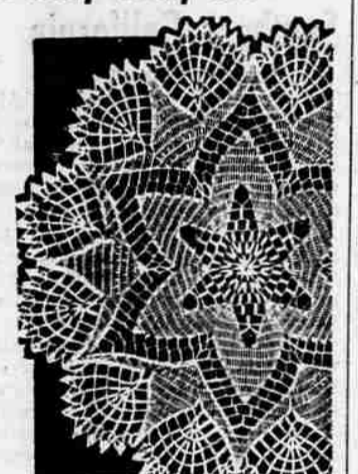
Sewing classes will present a fashion show and reports of the state convention will be given. This will be the last meeting of this season for the group.
