

Tornado Favored in District 6 A-1 At Klamath Falls Field on Saturday

Medford high school track and field men head for Klamath on Saturday intent on capturing the fourth consecutive district championship for the Black Tornado.

Tornado cindersmen have collected the district bunting each season since 1952 when Grants Pass took the title. Medfordites also have taken the first place trophy 10 out of 13 years.

Desirous as it is, the championship, nevertheless, will be a secondary goal. Main objective of Saturday's District 6 A-1 engagement will be to qualify for a large number of thinclads for next week's state meet at Corvallis.

The Tornado's aim in qualifying will be to gain sufficient strength to hang onto its state mantle. Klamath Falls, Ashland and Grants Pass will attempt to get sufficient qualifiers to threaten Medford's state supremacy.

On the basis of season records Medford goes into the Klamath hassle the big favorite with Grants Pass rated the Tornado's chief contender.

All four schools, the smallest field in A school eliminations in this area in at least many years, will be hoping for a fast track and sunny weather, conditions favorable for an assault on the record book. Season performances, particularly by the potent Medford club, give strong indication that some records will fall if the weather cooperates.

Four Marks Bettered
District marks in four events have been bettered by Tornado stalwarts this season and the Medford scantclads have displayed a tendency of week by week improvement. If that tendency continues into the Saturday fray, marks may fall even under adverse conditions.

District standards have been beaten by Lew Breazeale in the pole vault, Wally Larson in the low hurdles, Neil Plumley in the shot put and by Les Lingscheit, Bilbee Lane and Wilcey Winchell in the half-mile. Larson in the low hurdles and the Medford relay team of Larson, Pete Kershaw, Mike Russell and Mike Hawkins have run in only .1 second over the district mark.

Coach Bob Newland said that a squad of 33 Medfordites will make the jaunt to Klamath Falls. A complete roster, showing the exact line-up of Tornado participants in the meet, was not available from the mentor since performers in some spots still were not decided.

Kershaw, Christian Bid
The coach indicated that his crew is at near full strength physically. Newland reported that Kershaw and Loren Christian looked great in time trials of the quarter-mile this week and said, "They may be right up there pushing Mike Russell of Medford and Tom Farrell of Klamath on Saturday."

Preliminaries in the high hurdles and prelims in finals in the shot put and broad jump are to get underway at 11 a.m. tomorrow. Heats in the 100-yard

dash are billed for 11:30 a.m. with prelims and finals in the discus to begin at 11:45 a.m. Low hurdle heats are planned for 12 noon and those in the 220-yard dash at 12:30 p.m.

Finals in the pole vault, high jump and javelin are scheduled for 2:30 p.m. Other finals will be high hurdles at 3:30, 100 at 3:40, mile at 3:50, 440 at 4 p.m., low hurdles at 4:10, 220 at 4:20, half-mile at 4:30 and relay at 4:40.

A run-down follows, indicating the top contenders in each event:

100 and 220-yard dashes—Defending champion Stewart Baker, Ashland, will have strong opposition from Mike Hawkins and Bob Gould, Medford, Dave

Pepple, Klamath Falls, and Jim Cattanauch and Art Strunk, Grants Pass.

440-yard run—Mike Russell, Medford, and Tom Farrell, Klamath Falls, are the top rated runners but could run into trouble from Bill Curnow and Cattanauch, Grants Pass, and Pete Kershaw and Loren Christian, Medford.

880-yard run—Les Lingscheit, Bilbee Lane and Wilcey Winchell, Medford, have proved the men for other schools to beat with Mike Barrett, Grants Pass, their chief threat.

Boatman Favorite
Mike—Terry Boatman, Grants Pass, is favored to successfully defend his championship. Among his foes may be Barrett, Win-

chell, Medford, Doug Wilson, Klamath Falls, and Phil Austin, Klamath Falls.

High hurdles—Wally Larson, Medford, and Bert Klett, Grants Pass, so far have proved the leading high timber toppers of the district. Sander, Klamath Falls, Jim Maryott, Grants Pass, and Mike Stearns, Medford, are among contenders.

Low hurdles—Larson may face opposition from Sander, Maryott, Klett and Gary Riley, Medford.

Relay—Medford's crew of Larson, Kershaw, Russell and Hawkins is the team to beat with Klamath Falls and Grants Pass pressing for the honors.

Shot put—Neil Plumley, Medford, is favored with Pedro Colley, Klamath Falls, Dunn, Ashland, Allerheiligen, Grants Pass, and Jim Funston, Medford, also booming for a state meet spot.

Colley Top Platterman
Discus—Colley has done the top throwing in the district this year. Contenders include Larry Slessier, Larry Anderson, and Plumley, Medford; Larry Henderson, Grants Pass, and South, Ashland.

Javelin—Eldon Francis, Medford, the defending champ, will have tough rivalry from his teammate, Gary Lewis, and from Larry McFarland, Grants Pass.

Pole vault—Lew Breazeale, Medford, district record holder, and Phil Paquin, Grants Pass, are the top-rated entries. Each has exceeded the district mark. Stan Lewman, Grants Pass, and Harry Johnson, Ashland, are the other leading vaulters.

High jump—Fred Thomas and Jim Smith, Grants Pass, Bob Tisdell, Medford, Orin Perkins, Klamath Falls, and Gene Parent, Ashland, head the field and the district spots in the state meet could go to any two of them.

Broad jump—Jerry Close, Medford, has the best jump of the season, but may have to be at least near his best effort to outdo his own teammates, Tisdell, Hawkins and John Bellack, and Chick Weller and Cattanauch, Grants Pass, and Butch Kimpton, Klamath Falls.

Districts 6 A-2, 5-B Conduct Track Meets Saturday at Ashland

Athletes from 19 or more high schools in southern and southwestern Oregon collect at Southern Oregon college's Fuller field at Ashland Saturday to determine qualifiers for two of Oregon's three state prep championship track and field meets.

Thinclads from 12 schools will vie for District 6 A-2 laurels and berths in the A-2 meet the following week end in Corvallis. From seven to 10 schools will clash in the District 5B eliminations. Winners will journey next week to Springfield for a state titular struggle.

B school field events will begin at 10:30 a.m. at Ashland on Saturday races in both classes commence at 2 p.m. No prelims are needed in the A-2 district meets. Entries were cut to six participants in each event by northern and southern division scrambles last Saturday. In the shorter races B schools will have heats and time each runner.

A-2 schools at Ashland will be Eagle Point, Phoenix, Crater, Illinois Valley, Henley, Glendale, Myrtle Point, Sutherlin, Myrtle Creek, Bandon, Coquille and Douglas.

B Entrants
B entrants will be Jacksonville, Rogue River, St. Mary's of Medford, Prospect, Malin, Merrill and Bonanza and possibly Bly, Gilchrist and Chiloquin. St. Mary's will have 14 or 15 boys participating.

Crater will have the most berths in A-2 contention with 14, Eagle Point, Sutherlin and Myrtle Point each will have 10 spots. For the others the numbers are

Henley seven, Douglas, Myrtle Creek and Bandon each six, Phoenix and Illinois Valley each 5, Coquille four and Glendale on e. Several of the B schools will have huge entries. Others may have just a handful of athletes participating.

Top two placers in each event of each division will go to their respective state conflicts.

A review of Class B county meet results shows that Jackson county performers produced the better marks in the pole vault, the broad jump, the mile, the high jump, the quarter-mile and the javelin. Klamath's best showings bettered the Jackson times and distances in the shot put, the 100 and 220-yard dashes, the low hurdles, the discus, the half-mile and the relay.

Fishermen should not attempt to drive passenger cars into Fish lake this week end. That is the advice of Lloyd Morris, proprietor of the lake resort. He said, however, that trucks or pick-up trucks should be able to make it to the lake.

It is the last 1/2 miles of road into the lake that spell trouble for passenger vehicles, Morris stated. Dead Indian and McAllister Springs roads are in good shape and passenger cars can get within 1/2 miles of the lake. From that point on there are a number of holes too deep for vehicles other than trucks.

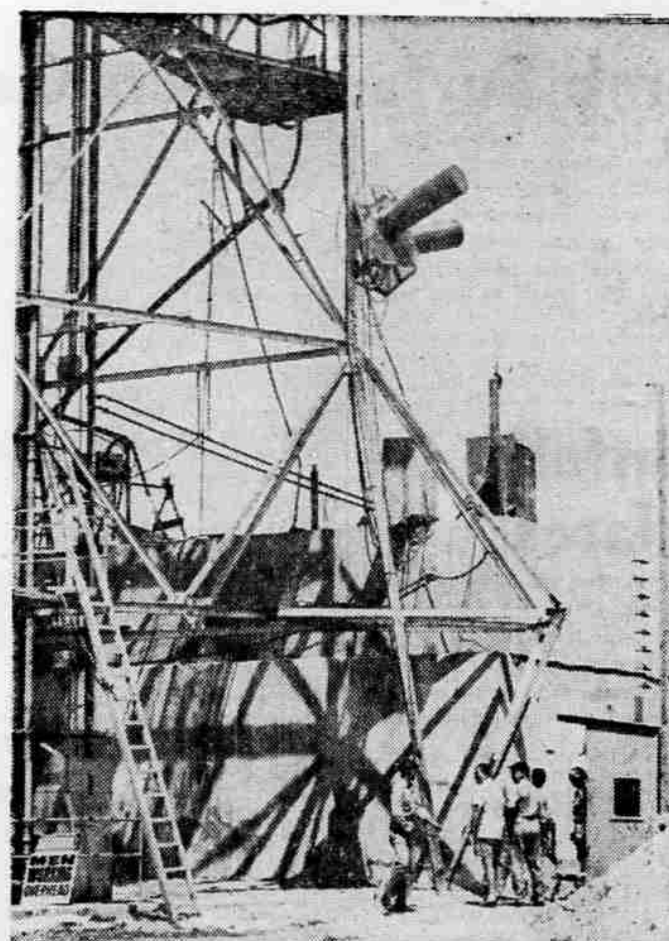

Butte Falls road is rough, according to Morris, and Cole Rivers, Game Commission biologist, said that route is practically impassable.

Road into Willow lake is good, Morris stated. Ground is muddy around the parking area. Fishing was good there yesterday. The resort proprietor mentioned that most of the anglers who did get through to Fish lake yesterday took their limits. Trolling with ford fenders and worms and still fishing with single eggs produced the best results.
