Back Stairs: Trials of Military Man

Washington — (U.P.) — Backstairs at the White House:
The trials of the military man know no end. Take the recent case of Roger Hagerty, handsome young son of White House press secretary James C. Hagerty.
The elder Hagerty received a letter the other day intended for his son. It was from Roger's draft board, local board No. 27 in Albany, N. Y., where Roger originally registered.
The board sent a long form to be filled out, asking Roger whether he had undergone any military service in the past and his present occupation and whereabouts.
Jim Hagerty sat down and wrote the board an apologetic note, saying Roger could not answer the inquiry at this time because he was a regular officer in the U. S. Marine Corps, presently serving with his outfit as a first lieutenant in the Mediterranean area.
There seems to have been a growing practice at the White House recently of announcing presidential visitors after they have been there.
For a long time, the White House announced a pretty complete appointment schedule for the President a day in advance. Now, the first appointment list given out for publication rarely is complete and a number of appointments are added the next day.
This may reflect a White House effort to keep the President's calling list more flexible and easier to change. It is sometimes embarrassing to the White House to cancel or delay an appointment once it has been announced.
Eight-year-old David Eisenhower was so impressive on the Gettysburg golf course last week-end that a spectator watching the President's grandson hit practice shots observed, "That kid will win the Open at the age of 12."

Hotel, where White House staff members, press radio and picture corps reside when Mr. Eisenhower is at his farm, was really jumping this past week-end.
It seemed that every few minutes another bus discharged a load of high school students visiting the famous battlefield. Many of them were en route for sight-seeing in Washington.
It was virtually impossible to get into the dining room at certain hours of the day. And added to the schoolchildren, there were hundreds of adults in Gettysburg for the week-end to visit their sons and daughters at Gettysburg College. It was a special mothers' week-end at the school.
Mr. Eisenhower is giving a lot of spare time consideration to the text of his speech later this month at Baylor University in Waco, Tex.
Without benefit of speech writers or advisers, he spent some time at his farm Monday morning work alone on a draft of the foreign policy address. He doesn't get many such opportunities.

Panty Raid Fails Despite Cooperation From Coeds

Baton Rouge, La. — (U.P.) — Police dispersed a throng of panty raiders on the Louisiana State University campus Wednesday night while scantily clad co-eds cavorted on dormitory balconies.
The disgruntled men students, retreating without a single souvenir, threw up a brick barrage that slightly injured one policeman. About 50 students were rounded up and hauled off to police headquarters for brief sojourns.
Met By Police
The crowd of men students was met by police forces armed with tear gas at each of several women's dormitories they tried to raid and not a single student got any lingerie, police said.
"We had them covered like gravy on rice," Lt. Louis Altamir said.
Police fired several tear gas shells into the crowd of men students scurrying about a cluster of women's dormitories in the center of the campus, forcing them to retreat.
Coeds tried to help them by tossing lingerie from windows, but it fell out of reach behind the police lines. Other girls paraded in shorts and pajamas on balconies of their besieged dormitories.
Students Surrounded
Then came the hail of bricks, rocks and dirt upon the police from the direction of the retreating students. One brick struck and slightly injured policeman Bill Scruggs.
City police and sheriff's deputies who had been tipped in advance momentarily surrounded the entire mass of student, capturing the 50 plus a sprinkling of high school students in the crowd.
