Next meeting will be a public card party at the Girls Community club on May 23.

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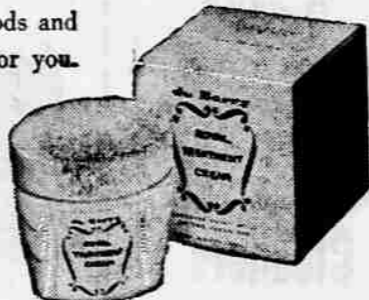


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
