Lane Trade Pays-Off Pronto As Dickson, Wehmeier Aid SL

Frank Lane's acquisition of Murry Dickson and Herman Wehmeier paid its first big dividend yesterday and proved anew that the St. Louis Cardinals' boss has a "golden touch" in the trade mart.

Dickson and Wehmeier made their debuts with the Cardinals on Sunday, 48 hours after Lane obtained them in a five player deal with the Philadelphia Phillies.

The 39-year-old Dickson was 0-3 with the Phillies this season but Sunday he went 2 2/3 innings in the opener to pick up his first victory of the season.

Jackie Collum, acquired from the Redlegs in another Lane deal, won his third game of the year in the nightcap but it was Wehmeier, 0-2 this season before St. Louis obtained him, who closed out the game with two hitless innings of relief pitching.

The Cardinals scored all their runs in the fourth inning of the opener with Dickson himself doubling to drive in a run. Then Ken Boyer drove in five runs with his seventh and eighth homers to lead a bristling 13-hit assault on six pitchers in the nightcap.

Duke Snider drove in five runs with a grand slam and a solo homer to lead the Brooklyn Dodgers to a 6-4 decision over the New York Giants. Don Newcombe was credited with his fifth win although he needed relief from Clem Labine in the seventh.

The Pittsburgh Pirates handed the Phillies their 10th straight loss 11-9, routing ex-card Harvey Haddix in his debut but the Phillies held a 6-2 lead when the second game was suspended until July 3 because of the state curfew law.

Dave Philley's three-run homer and George Zuverink's relief pitching gave the Baltimore Orioles a 5-1 victory after the New York Yankees won their opener, 11-2.

Al Rosen and Rocky Colavito homered to lead the Cleveland Indians to a 9-4 win after Art Ditmar's four hitter enabled the Kansas City Athletics to beat Bob Feller, 5-2, in their opener. Herb Score won the nightcap although Art Houtteman finished up.

Billy Pierce scattered 10 hits and won his fourth game as the Chicago White Sox routed the Detroit Tigers, 8-1, and Jackie Jensen and Jim Piersall hit homers to lead the Boston Red Sox to a 5-3 triumph over the Washington Senators in the other American league games.

Veteran Boatman Prefers Running Rogue to Driving on SF Freeway

"I'd rather run the river any day than drive one of the freeways in San Francisco. The river's a lot safer, believe me."

That's the feeling of Sid Pyle, master Rogue river boatman and veteran guide.

Sid and his brother, Press, have been running the Rogue, one of the Pacific coast's most famed and beautiful streams, for 28 years. They take passengers on the awesome 126-mile boat voyage down the river from Grants Pass to Gold Beach.

The Pyle brothers man the oars on the stretches over the Rogue's torrential rapids. They take pride in the accident-free record over their many years on the fabulous stream.

The thrilling run down the Rogue has drawn attention and has attracted travelers from near and far because of the dramatic experience, the contrasts and the fishing it provides. Waters on southern Oregon farmed river are rampaging and roaring on some parts of the journey and clear and serene at other stages. Scenery ranges from fresh and green to rocky and rugged and life along the banks is both wild and calm.

Trout, steelhead, deer and bear abound for the nimrods. Charging \$200 per person, with a special rate of \$150 during the summer, the Pyles take as many as eight people at a time on the five day jaunts down the Rogue. Days are spent on the water and nights in comfortable riverside lodges. Fall trips, when the sportsmen go for the
