A squad of 11 men, perhaps 12 if a relay alternate makes the trip, are scheduled to make Medford high's bid for a fourth consecutive state track and field mantle Friday and Saturday in the A-1 school struggle at Corvallis.

This, in compact form, is the Black Thornado line-up for its "trip to state": Wally Larson, high and low hurdles, relay; Jerry Close, broad jump; Neil Plumley, shot put; Dave Johnson, high jump; Eldon Francis, javelin; 100-yard dash, relay; Lew Breazeale, pole vault; Mike Russell, 440-yard run, relay; Billee Lane, half-mile; Les Ling-scheit, half-mile; Pete Kershaw, relay.

That formidable group which gives Medford an entry in 11 of the 14 events in the titular scrape, will be one of the largest single school entries appearing on the Oregon State campus this week end. Medford already has been established as the favorite on the basis of performances throughout the season and, if the Tornados equal, or at least come close to, their best efforts of the year, there should be no upset in the A-1 bracket at Corvallis.

The Tornado will go for its eighth state nine crown in 10 years and its 13th in 17 tries. Medfordites will be out to gain a better margin than that of last year. Tornado thinslads were champions by one-third point.

HAVE ANOTHER CHANCE

Medford high entries came out just about as expected in the District 6 cinder rivalry last Saturday at Klamath Falls. There were a few disappointed Tornado athletes. But, in some cases where the fellows may have thought they should have done better, they still qualified for the state — which was the important thing — and still have a chance to improve on their district efforts.

STRONG DISTRICT

This department is awaiting more complete information on district meets elsewhere in the state before making a comparison of times. Information already available shows the top marks in most events for District 6 A-1, adding to its stature as the strong district in Oregon prepdom.

CRATER COULD FARE WELL

Crater high with six men qualified for six events in the state A-2 track engagement won't have the depth Medford carries into the A-1 battle but the Comets just might place well up on the point list. With the A schools divided into two classes this year, the A-2 group makes up the largest group in number of schools. That means a larger number of schools should be represented in the A-2 meet than in A-1. And with that the situation a little may be able to go a long way.

The Crater roster for the Corvallis competition is Jack Lilly, discus; George Juveland, 100 and 220-yard dashes; Dick Davis, high jump; Craig Cochran, high jump; Don Goyette, pole vault, and Bob Mason, broad jump. With Juveland entered in two events the Comets actually have seven state meet berths.

BINGHAM THROWS 215

Ed Bingham, all-American track and field man while at Medford high, got off a fine javelin heave of 215 feet 2 inches last Saturday in the Pacific Northwest Conference Northern Division meet at Eugene. The University of Oregon spearman upset Darrell Pearson of Washington State.

Jack Morris, Jack Moad and

Don Spinas were other ex-Medford stars who helped collect points that gave Oregon the triumph in the meet. Morris won the low hurdles in :24 flat. He took second in the century sprint and was just a shade behind Sam Wesley, Oregon State, who won the event in :09.8. Moad, another ex-prep all-American, was fourth in the shot put and Spinas was a member of the winning relay quartet.

SHOULD BOOST INTEREST

Commenting on the new outfield fence at the fairgrounds baseball park, Manager Jack Cooney of the Medford Cheney Studs has expressed the belief that the new set-up "will really help the hitters" and stimulate interest of fans. A fence has been built 18 to 20 feet inside the old outer wall and its construction should increase the homer production in the park.

Jim Pisoni Leads Mounties To 4-2 Triumph Over Stars

Vancouver, B. C.—(U.P.)—The cellar-dwelling Vancouver Mounties have finally reached the conclusion that the only way to climb the Pacific Coast League ladder is to take the lowest rungs first—so they're working at it.

Last night the Canadians made it two in a row over seventh-place Hollywood by taking a 4-2 victory in the only game played in the loop.

The Stars outthit the red coats 10 to 8, but Jim Pisoni did the

damage. The Mountie center-fielder drove in three runs and scored the fourth one himself.

The Mounties struck in the first inning with two runs. Witty Quintana singled, Johnny Jorgensen walked, George Metkovich sacrificed them along, and a single by Pisoni brought the runners across.

The Stars struck back with one run in the second on Bob Honor's double and Paul Pettit's single, and tied the score in the third on singles by loser Fred Waters and Ramon Mejias and an infield out.

But the Mounties took command again in the bottom of the third when Pisoni doubled home one run and scored on Jim Westlake's single.

Although the Hollywood hitters got to George Bamberger in the early innings, he improved with age. He allowed only one hit in the last four innings and his teammates backed him up with two double-plays.

All eight teams in the league see action today. Sacramento plays at Los Angeles, San Diego at San Francisco, Hollywood at Seattle and Portland at Vancouver.

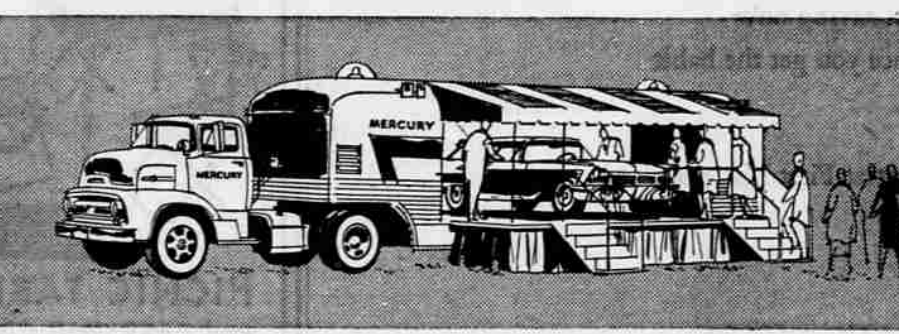
