## Bob Keegan Pitches White Sox to 5 to 1 Victory Over Solons

Bob Keegan, who was headed for the minors only a week ago, today has the Chicago White Sox back into the thick of the American league race.

A sore arm case of most of last year when he didn't win a game until Aug. 31, the 35-year-old Keegan reeled off his second straight triumph Tuesday night when he beat the Washington Senators, 5-1, with a nine-hitter. He hasn't yielded an earned run in 21 2-3 innings this season and the two victories equal his entire 1955 total.

The victory was the fifth straight for the White Sox and moved them to within a game and a half of the Cleveland Indians and New York Yankees who were rained out Tuesday night. On May 9, the White Sox had plummeted to sixth place with a 6-8 record and Manager Marty Marion was considering sending Keegan to the minors.

The next day, however, Keegan pitched 8 2-3 scoreless innings in relief to gain a 2-1 decision over the Boston Red Sox. The White Sox went on to sweep a three-game series with the Detroit Tigers and back came Keegan Tuesday night with another splendid performance.

Keegan had pitched 19 1-3 consecutive scoreless innings when the Senators got an unearned run with the aid of an error by centerfielder Jim Rivera. He was backed by a 14-hit attack that included three hits each by Bob Nieman and Nelson Fox and which dealt Chuck Stobbs his second loss of the year.

The Baltimore Orioles pounded out 14 hits to beat the Kansas City Athletics, 9-5, and the Detroit Tigers snapped a three-game losing streak with a 6-3 decision over the Boston Red Sox in other American league games.

Jim Wilson received credit for his fourth victory although it was George Zuverink, relieving for the 15th time this season, who kept the Athletics in check after they cut Baltimore's margin to four runs in the seventh.

The Tigers routed nemesis Willard Nixon with eight hits and five runs in four innings to drop the Red Sox back to the .500-mark. Paul Foytack won

his second game for the Tigers although he needed help from Steve Gromek in the last two innings. Nixon had entered the game with a 12-5 lifetime edge over Detroit.

**Dodgers Gain Ground**  
In the National league, the Brooklyn Dodgers rolled to their fifth consecutive triumph with a 7-5 verdict over the St. Louis Cardinals. Gil Hodges and PeeWee Reese walloped homers for the Dodgers, who now are only one game out of first place.

Rookie shortstop Don Blasingame was the goat, his two errors preceding Reese's three-run, game-clinching round-tripper.

Stu Miller, obtained in the big five-player deal with the Cardinals last Friday, snapped the Philadelphia Phillies' 10-game losing streak with a 3-1 triumph over the Milwaukee Braves. Miller yielded six hits and struck out five in out-pitching Lew Burdette. A year ago to the day the Phillies had snapped their longest losing streak of 1955—a 13-game skid.

Willie Mays and Don Mueller homered and Johnny Antonelli turned in a five-hit night to give the New York Giants a 6-4 win over the Chicago Cubs in the other National league game. The loss was the Cubs' 12th in 14 games and dropped them into the National league cellar.

Gene Mauch was the big gun for the Angels, clouting two home runs and driving in six tallies in the romp over the pesky Solons. The Angels clouted a total of 17 hits while Dave Hillman was holding the Sacramentans to five.
