Instead of lying on a conventional hospital bed, he is on a Stryker frame, which is revolved every two hours as a therapy treatment. Mrs. Nettie Dunlap, RN, is credited by associates as being helpful toward his recovery. She spends free time with him giving him his physiotherapy treatments. He made the three model airplanes shown on the wall in the picture, which he made with one hand, and would be pleased to have more of them. Young Gary Lee Hankins of Dairy, Ore., has been flat on his back or on his stomach, as the case may be, at Sacred Heart hospital since he was brought to Medford by Mercy Flights Feb. 28. He was accidentally shot in the back by a .22 calibre bullet. Both legs and an arm were paralyzed at the time, but they are now steadily improving. Ten-year-old Gary, son of Mr. and Mrs. Orrin Hankins, Dairy, is on a Stryker frame. This is rotated every two hours, not only for the patient's comfort but to improve muscle and skin tones. Like all boys his age, Gary was an active one until his recent misfortune. "I've ridden horseback all my life," he explained and went on to tell about his two-year-old mare, "Flicka," part quarter horse and part thoroughbred, at the ranch of his grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. L. M. Hankins, where he makes his home with his parents, four brothers and a sister. He hopes some day to break "Flicka" for riding. Older than Gary are his brothers, John and Dennis, and Dennis' twin, Jean, the sister; and younger are Ernie and Jesse. The ranch where they live is devoted mainly to raising wheat, alfalfa and other grains. Asked in an interview this week what he liked best to do, he answered, "make model airplanes, ride horseback and sleep."

Model Airplanes While hospitalized the boy has made three model airplanes, using only the one hand, and he spends a lot of time reading. He especially likes comic books about horses, and Walt Disney, Donald Duck and Tarzan comics. He also does quite a bit of coloring with crayons while lying on his stomach. A great company for him is his television set given to him through radio station KBOY. Lynda Schultz, a third grade student at Jackson school, has loaned him her radio, and Gary has received many cards in the mail. "Mom gets over every Wednesday to see me and dad comes over on Sundays," the boy explained. His mother stayed with him, however, for the first several weeks after his injury. Nurses at the hospital spend free time with him before or after duty, bringing him milk shakes and other treats and visiting with him. One nurse, Mrs. Nettie Dunlap, RN, spends much of her free time giving Gary physiotherapy treatments. Hospital personnel all remark on what a "good patient" Gary is.

### Sewer Installation Authorized for Dairy

The Medford city council last night approved a request from Jorgensen Dairy for a sewer connection to the city system. The council waived restrictions on the sewer connection outside the city limits after Jorgensen submitted a petition requesting annexation of all the firm's property between Court st. and Riverside ave. north of Ohio st. Previously, Jorgensen requested annexation of about half the property. The planning commission recommended the entire property be annexed. The council last night discussed possibilities of annexation of the entire block, and authorized a sewer connection for Jorgensen prior to annexation. Jorgensen said the sewer connection was necessary so plumbing facilities at the new plant under construction may be tested.

### Morse Wants Fast Farm Income Action

Portland — U.P. — Sen. Wayne Morse (D-Ore.) said last night that the time has come when something must be done immediately to halt dropping farm income. Morse, in a radio broadcast carried by 21 Oregon stations, said the administration's farm program had greatly damaged the purchasing power of the American farmer. He said the amount spent to support farm prices in the past 22 years was a small cost for maintaining high purchasing power for American farmers. He called the \$2 per bushel support price offered for wheat this year "a soothing syrup."

Morse introduced Sen. Estes Kefauver and Adlai Stevenson in Eugene last night and then returned to Washington, D.C. for debate on the Niagara power bill.

### Oregonians Bilked By Confidence Man

Salem — (U.P.) — A confidence man who poses as a relative has apparently duped three elderly Marion county folk of substantial amounts of money. Sheriff Denver Young said the most recent victim was an 83-year-old Marion resident who gave \$380 to a man identifying himself as "a cousin from Indiana." Earlier, a 79-year-old Turner man was relieved of \$125 and a Silverton man bilked of \$90.

### Anaconda Plans Expansion Program

Anaconda, Mont. — (U.P.) — A top official of the Anaconda Co. one of the nation's largest copper producers, today outlined plans for expansion of the firm during the next five years.

Roy H. Glover, chairman of the board, told the annual stockholders' meeting here that "investments we have in mind for the next five years, exceed those made during the past 10 years." And during this 5-year period, these investments will have exceeded the total book value of all the Anaconda properties, including its subsidiaries, at the end of World War II," he said. Glover said the firm, which also operates mines in South America, had earnings of \$29,883,372 for the first quarter of 1956, compared with \$14,203,218 for the same 1955 period. This would be \$3.45 per share for the most recent quarter and \$1.64 per share for the first quarter of last year.
