Ordinances Adopted Authorize Paving, Other Improvements

Ordinances authorizing paving, sanitary sewer, and water main projects were adopted by the Medford city council last night.

Ordinances adopted authorized paving North Keene Way dr. from Jackson st. to Oregon ave.; East Second st. from Front st. to Central ave.; and Whitman st. from Holmes st. to Garfield st.

The council also accepted a petition for paving West 12th st. from Fir st., to the Southern Pacific tracks. Property owners submitted a petition suggesting that interested parties deposit with the city an amount equal to the cost of the paving and that the city prepare plans and specifications at the expense of the property owners. The council will consider adopting of plans and specifications for the project later.
