Mothers Granted Permission for Sale of Daisies

They also provide clothing and other necessities for wheelchair members who have no source of income.

Installation of officers will be held, with Mrs. Fred Underwood, a past president of Washington Parent-Teacher association, as installing officer.

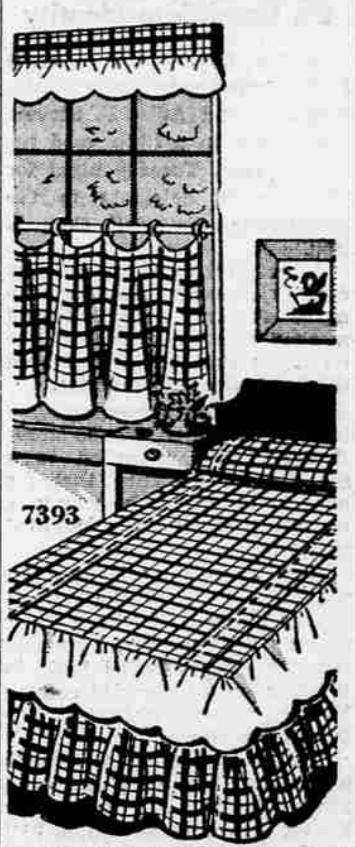
Child care will be provided at a nominal cost in Room 26 by sixth grade girls.
