# O & C Reforestation Resolution Approved

Portland — (U.P.) — A resolution calling for a fund of \$1,000,000 to be spent annually for reforestation of Oregon and California reforested lands in Western Oregon has been approved by the O and C Association.

Frank S. Sever, O and C attorney, said today that the resolution called for an appointment of the money by Congress, to be reimbursed by timber sales receipts.

O and C counties receive 75 per cent of the income from timber sales.

Sever told the O and C advisory board that in the past only meager funds had been appropriated for reforestation. Some 25,000 acres of timber are harvested from the lands annually and about half that amount would have to be artificially reseeded.

Charles A. Sprague, Salem publisher and public representative on the advisory board, was reelected chairman at the meeting in Portland.

Harvey Andrew Fauset, 53, of 34 Vancouver ave., is reported in critical condition at Community hospital today as the result of what appeared to be a self-inflicted gun shot, city police, said today.

Officers said Fauset apparently shot himself through the head with a .38 caliber revolver yesterday afternoon while sitting on the davenport in his home.

Fauset's wife, Emma Irene said she had left home about 9:15 a.m. and returned at 2:20 p.m. to find her husband wounded. She said she immediately called the Medford Ambulance service, who notified local police.

Mrs. Fauset was quoted as saying her husband had been upset recently and had not been employed for the past six months.

Police reports indicated Fauset had made a previous attempt to commit suicide on April 20, 1955.
