SCIENCE AT WORK By DELOS SMITH

New York — (U.P.) — Very quietly and slowly hypnosis is becoming "respectable" with doctors of medicine. They have known for a long time, as has everyone else, that there is something to it, and there now is no question of it being good medicine in some conditions of ill health.

The questions are, what conditions and to what extent? Leaders of medical science are encouraging the younger and more daring practitioners to find out, in their work with patients, on a really scientific basis. The trouble has been and still is, a certain lack of respectability.

In the words of Dr. Richard Asher, who has quietly used hypnosis in general medical practice for 12 years:

"It has tended to become the province of the riffraff of medicine, the sport of the music halls, and a popular item on television. Probably the sinister notoriety with which sensational literature has endowed the subject has scared away many who might have made serious and sincere use of it."

A fellow of the Royal College of Physicians, he expressed his opinions in the journal of the British Medical Association, which gave his views official sanction.

In this country, the growing interest in the most respectable medical circles has been apparent, and the International Universities Press has just found the interest sufficient to publish two out-of-print scientific works on the medical applications of hypnosis by the late Dr. Paul Schilder, a Viennese who pioneered in the field in the 20's under the title, "The Nature of Hypnosis."

All this dovetails with the de-

veloping science of psychosomatics—the influence of the mind upon the body. From the standpoint of the conservative physician, hypnosis is—in Dr. Asher's words—"a state of exaggerated suggestibility produced by suggestion and fixing of the attention."

In patients under hypnosis, he has produced some remarkable effects—he has caused warts to disappear and blotched skins to clear up; he has blotted the hysteria of hysteria neurotics and deflated the anxiety of anxiety neurotics.

But in no case would he say positively that the effects were due entirely to the suggestions given the patients under hypnosis or that some other medical treatment wouldn't have done as well.

His principal recommendation was that "hypnosis is worthy of more adequate study by medical men. Publicity and misuse by charlatans may have discouraged serious workers. More work is needed before the value and limitations of hypnosis are defined."

He was particularly conservative in describing his results in wart removal which seem spectacular to a layman—a 12-year-old schoolboy had 53 warts, mainly on his hands, which had been present for five years. After 10 hypnotic treatments, all the warts had disappeared, but Asher said:

"These results do not prove anything, as not enough is known about the natural recovery rate of untreated warts," and anyway, warts are "known to be readily amenable to primitive forms of suggestion and superstition."

GM President Sees Cut in Car Sales

Detroit — (U.P.) — General Motors President Harlow H. Curtis predicted Tuesday that 5,800,000 autos will be sold this year, a drop of 21 per cent from sales in 1955.

Curtice also said 1957 autos would carry a higher price tag. The GM chief said his company, with "about 50,000" laid off already from the peak 1955 work force, will order more layoffs this week. But he said the new figure was "not large."

Labor Department figures and layoffs announced by other firms in the past week indicated auto industry unemployment in the nation totaled about 130,000.

Curtice blamed a "downward trend" in auto sales and production on credit policies of the Federal Reserve board. He said the board on April 1 put another increase into effect on rediscount rates for bank credits or resale of bank loan paper.
