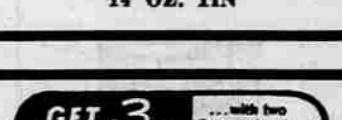

Confessed Slayer Tells of Shooting War II Buddies

Panama City, Fla.—(U.P.)—The confessed slayer of two small brothers told newsmen Wednesday night how he turned his machine gun on fellow GIs during a fierce World War II battle.

The bizarre story told by Dallas Withers, 33, is backed up by lie detector tests, Sheriff M. J. Daffin said.

Details Spilled Out

Withers, confined to a secret out-of-town jail because of high feeling over the deaths of David and Douglas Wilson, spilled out details of how he machine-gunned American troops in Germany early in 1945.

"I've got nothing to lose," he told newsmen. "I want to clear my conscience."

Daffin said lie detector tests appeared to verify Withers' confession of drowning David, 7, and Douglas, 4, by tossing them from his boat last May 1, and also his account of the battle-front episode.

However, chief investigator Floyd D. Nixon said that while he believed the drowning story because of supporting evidence, he considered the story of the machine gun incident "a lie."

"I don't know how many I killed," Withers told reporters visiting his cell. "I don't know why I did it."

Supporting Riflemen

He said that while a member of Company D, 304th Infantry Regiment, 76th Infantry Division, he was supporting a squad of riflemen deployed 300 yards ahead of him during a night bombardment. He said he deliberately lowered the sights of his gun and opened fire.

Casualties from the enemy bombardment were so great that if his shots by chance hit any of the Americans the U.S. authorities never realized it, Withers said.

Video Reception Mystery Cleared

Wildwood-by-the-Sea, N.J. (U.P.)—A months-old mystery of strange interference with television reception in a Wildwood neighborhood was recently cleared up by electricians who came up with the offenders from a totally unsuspected source.

It was an old-type Edison electric light bulb estimated to be at least 25 years old.

The electricians said the old bulb was apparently radiating a carrier wave back into the alternating current line. They said thousands of similar bulbs probably are still giving light in seldom-used places such as attics, porches and outbuildings.

Joyce Keller Hearing Delayed by Arguments

Portland — (U.P.) — Argument over the admissibility of a tape recording took up the entire day in the trial of Mrs. Joyce Keller yesterday and was expected to continue for some time today.

Mrs. Keller, being tried here on a charge of taking part in the bombing of the Meier and Frank department store last year, through her attorneys contends that a tape recording made by her brother-in-law is not admissible as evidence in the case.
