

Black Tornado Eyes Klamath Falls Games

Intent and confident, but knowing they'll be up against a tough adversary, the Medford high baseballers travel to Klamath Falls Saturday. Their objective is to tuck away the Southern Oregon Conference and District 6 A-1 crowns.

Medford and Klamath Falls will meet in a doubleheader beginning at 1:30 p.m.

The Black Tornado carries a record of seven wins and three losses in the league into the twinbill and has the loop leadership, Klamath, on the other hand, is the conference cellarite with two victories and eight defeats.

But the strange part about it is that Klamath's Pelicans are so far down in the circuit. The Pels appear to have the hitting power to win and pitching depth to go with the hitting. But the potential has produced few victories. That strength could erupt Saturday as the Pels, with no chance to rise from the bottom of the heap, nevertheless make a try to be a spoiler.

Stature Greater

Medford, which has risen as the southern Oregon leader and a top club in the state after an uncertain start, will be favored to sweep the two games. The Tornado needs only one triumph to sew up the circuit but will be trying extra hard in both games since a loss in both would force it into a championship play-off with the Grants Pass Cavemen.

Coach John Kovenz said that Henry Putney probably will get

the pitching call for the opener tomorrow. Ernie Tyler may go on the hill in the second ruckus. Others who could see mound duty are Duane Sides and Dick McLaughlin. Mentor Ray Coley of Klamath will pick his moundsmen from among Earle Tichenor, Mike Runge, Darrell Rusth and Mickey Carney.

Plans previously were announced for an afternoon-night series at Klamath Falls. Kovenz nixed the idea because the Black Tornado squad has not played under the lights this season.

Victory over the Pelicans will send Medford into state quarterfinals against Eugene or Roseburg. Quarter-finalist from this region will tackle Grant of Portland or The Dalles.

Bowerman Teacher for Track Clinic

San Francisco — (U.P.) — The greatest collection of world renown track and field coaches ever to gather outside an Olympics game will be in Berkeley, Calif., June 11-20, for the first international track and field clinic.

Bud Winter, San Jose State coach and clinic chairman, said today that 15 nations already have agreed to send coaches — and there were prospects that more would come.

"We have so many coaches coming," said Winter, "that now we are wondering where we are going to house them. In addition to the foreign coaches, we expect about 500 college and high school coaches from United States to attend."

Nothing of this nature ever before has been attempted in the coaching ranks. Mainly, of course, because only track and field and possibly tennis has such international appeal.

Coaches Named

Visiting foreign coaches already named to appear at the clinic are:

Canada: Lloyd Percival, Toronto, and Lloyd Swindells, Vancouver.

Sweden: Goster Holmer, distance running authority and former coach of Gunder Haag; and Sven Stromberg.

Norway: Arne Nytro.

Japan: Mikio Oda, expert in hop-step-and-jump.

West Germany: Toni Nett.

Pakistan: Sharees Ahmad Khan.

Guatemala: Augusto Robles.

Finland: Kaleur Ramputti, coach of the army team.

Italy: Gregorio Oberwager, great discus coach.

Puerto Rico: Eugenio Guerra.

Australia: Fran Stamfl.

Trinidad, Iran, Haiti and Turkey also have agreed to send coaches, but so far haven't named the representative.

This group will be joined in teaching at the clinic by the top American coaches, such as Jess Mortenson, USC; Chick Werner, Penn State; Bill Bowerman, Oregon; Cornelius Dutch Warmerdam, Fresno State; Bus Schmek, Marquette; Oliver Jackson, Abilene Christian; Clyde Littlefield, Texas; George Eastman, Manhattan; Ken Doherty, Pennsylvania; and Peyton Jordan, Occidental.

Los Angeles — (U.P.) — The weather and the betting are unsettled for tonight's return middleweight title fight between Sugar Ray Robinson and Carl (Bobo) Olson at Wrigley Field.

From Uncle Sam's bureau came the forecast of "cool, with possible light sprinkles."

And from the Derby club at Las Vegas, Nev., came news of increased support for Olson that might cause a late switch and sending the baldish ex-champ into the ring favored to recapture the 160-pound crown.

"Our man-to-man price favoring Robinson has just dropped from 13-10 to 12-10," said a spokesman at the Derby Club.

"And some of our friends in the East are quoting even money. Olson may be favored at ring time."

Show Must Go On

Thirty-five-year-old Robinson of New York and 27-year-old Olson of San Francisco will start their nationally televised and broadcast 15-round at 10 p.m. EDT even if old Jupe Pluvius should be drenching the ballpark of the Los Angeles Angels. The sponsors paid \$100,000 for the TV-radio rights, and the show must go on, according to the promoters. The ring will be protected.

As the eight box offices opened at Wrigley Field today, directors of the Hollywood American Legion Stadium, who are promoting the fight, estimated the advance sale at \$160,000. They were uncertain if the weather would curtail the expected 17,500 fans and \$200,000 gate, a record for California.

Although Olson is a three-time loser to Sugar Ray in their trio of previous fights, he is robustly supported for this one because many boxing men believe champion Robinson's ancient legs will tire badly if the bout lasts more than seven rounds.

Aggressive Bobo, who sets a blistering pace, was favored at 3-1 at Chicago Stadium last Dec. 9 because of his youth and stamina and because Robinson had not been impressive while winning five of his six previous comeback bouts. But Sugar Ray cut loose with a burst of head-punches that knocked out Bobo at 2:51 of the second round and made Robinson the first man in ring history to recapture the middleweight crown twice.

Quits Ring Retirement

Sugar Ray, when welterweight ruler in February, 1951, wrested the middleweight crown from Jake LaMotta; but he lost it to Randy Turpin of England in July '51 and won it back from Turpin in Sept. '51. He gave up the title in '52 after collapsing in the 14th round of his attempt to win the light-heavyweight crown from Joey Maxim. He remained in retirement two years.

The champion has been impressive in training at San Jacinto, Calif. He concentrated on keeping his sparmates at a distance with solid left jabs and nailing them with rights when they attempted to flurry. But he was using inferior sparmates.

Olson was less impressive at nearby Santa Monica as he bore into his mates and tried to belt their bodies while cramping their punching room. But he used main event fighters for sparmates.

CRATER, DOUGLAS HOLD A-2 DECIDER SATURDAY

Central Point — Crater high will be out to add the baseball title to its District 6 A-2 track championship Saturday.

The Comet diamonders will be hogs to Douglas high in a play-off game here. Winner will enter the state A-2 quarterfinals the following week end. Saturday game time is 2 p.m.

The tussle could be the last of the season for the Comets on their home field and thereby also the final appearance of three seniors, Catcher Harold Leffler, Outfielder Allen Gosnell and Outfielder-First Baseman John Shama.

However, Crater, in its final effort as an A-2 competitor, still has state title aims and, should they get to the semi-final round of contention, that game would be here. Victor on Saturday likely will face Junction City in the quarter-finals and a win by the District 6 champ over the Tigers probably would mean a contest with Vale. Both Junction City and Vale are considered among the best in the state.

Fred Herrman doubtless will be assigned the Crater mound duties. He's recognized as one of the leading twirlers in this section of the state. Probable pitcher for Douglas is Bob Gilman who scattered eight hits last Monday as the Trojans beat Glendale 7 to 5 in the district's northern division play-off.

Gilman has a 6-0 won-lost record for 42 1/3 innings of tossing. He has allowed just 10 hits and the hard throwing junior owns an earned run average of 1.25. Larry Bissenette leads Trojan hitting with .444. Bill Rudzik has .382, Pete Amorde .364 and Jake Horn .292. Horn has been hitting in the clutch recently and collected a homer and a triple against Glendale.

Crater is the defending district titlist. The Comets were undefeated in six subdistrict games this season and gave a fine account of themselves in action with A-1 schools.

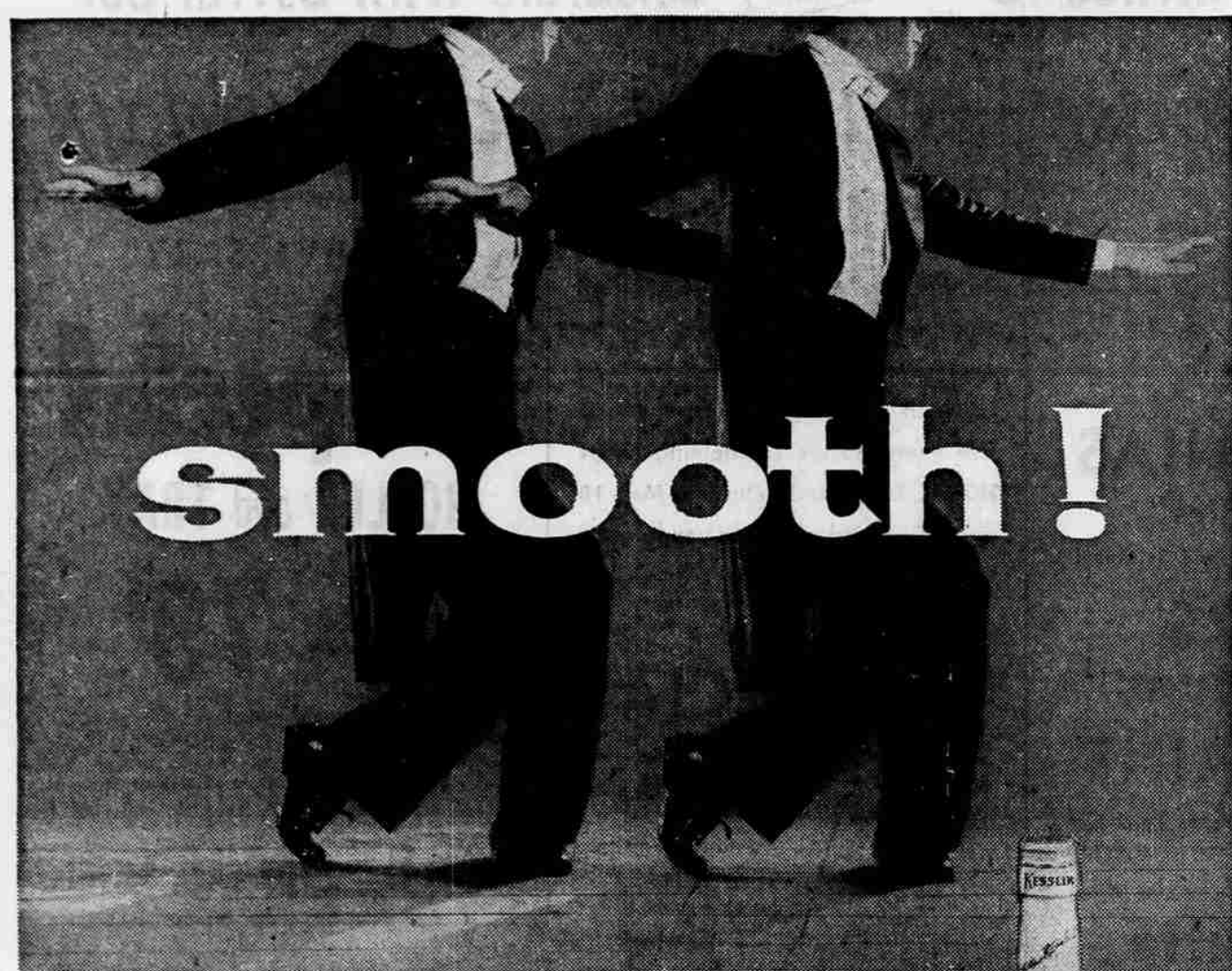
