Dr. Odell Discusses Small Schools With Kiwanians Wednesday

Small independent schools of the state feel that they can produce facilities sufficient to meet the problem of increasing college enrollments, Dr. Morgan Odell, president of Lewis and Clark College, Portland, informed members of Medford Kiwanis club Wednesday at their luncheon meeting.

Dr. Odell discussed the matter of cooperation between business and education. He spoke of the crisis in education created by increased enrollment resulting from both the higher birth rate and demands of society. However, he mentioned that subsidizing support is "rolling up in tremendous tide" from national and local businesses.

'Four-Star' Year
The college president termed 1955 a "four-star" year for higher education and the interest shown in it by big business. He mentioned distribution to schools of \$250,000,000 by industry, saying nevertheless, that the amount was just a "drop in the bucket" in meeting needs.

Dr. Odell spoke of the Ford foundation grants, direct contribution of the National Merit Scholarship program. The joint solicitation of industry by educational institutions for aid to balance operating budgets was also discussed by Odell.

Recognition of the need of basic ability of the mind and a background of education in business has caused businessmen to become concerned with higher education, the educator pointed out. He pointed to need of general as well as special education and ability to analyze problems.

Salaries Fall Behind
Concerning the fact that students of ability do not go on to school for economic reasons, Dr. Odell said, "We know we have been losing brains."

He also stated that college salaries have fallen behind in the race for professional income. He indicated those factors among reasons why industrial grants are welcomed.
