Medford AAUW Branch Holds Annual Installation

Mrs. Frances Willett, who makes her home in Medford and teaches at Crater High school, was installed president of Medford branch, American Association of University Women, at a meeting held Wednesday. The installation took place at the annual presidents' dinner at Girls Community club.

The dinner honored Mrs. Emerson Anderson, retiring president of the branch.

Others taking office were Mrs. A. J. Johannson, first vice-president; Mrs. Milo Kubalek, second vice-president; Mrs. James McGoodwin, secretary and Mrs. John Carnegie, treasurer.

During the business meeting Mrs. Willett and Mrs. Anderson reported on the recent state convention of AAUW, the former giving the legislative report and the latter the general convention report. After the convention session, the two Medford delegates declared they believed the Medford branch is not surpassed by any other in Oregon except in size of membership. Accomplishments and activities equal larger branches, and surpass those of equal size, the two delegates stated.

The local branch is particularly proud of the fact that two fellowship grants of \$500 each have been contributed by the local group to the national AAUW in the past two years. The first was named for Mrs. Justin Smith, for many years an AAUW leader, and the second was named for the branch.

The branch has a number of study groups, promotes an art show each year during National Art week, sponsors a radio program for children and sponsors a children's play each year as a means of earning money for the fellowship grants.

At the convention the Medford branch was particularly commended by Mrs. Willard M. Sanzenbacher for the quality of the branch survey on nursery school and kindergarten facilities in this county. This was part of a state-wide project and Mrs. Sanzenbacher stated "the Medford branch did the most outstanding job of all 29 branches on the pre-school survey." The report was the work of Miss Rhoda Williams.

Mrs. Anderson reported that a number of recommendations grew out of the state-wide survey. AAUW has recommended that the state system of education make a further study of public education on the pre-school level; that the budget include a full time pre-school consultant on the state board of education who would be available to advise groups and schools throughout the state; that AAUW and others promote the addition of courses to institutions of higher learning which would train a larger number of kindergarten and nursery school teachers and that AAUW give any possible assistance to professional groups interested in this work in an effort to raise pre-school standards in Oregon.

The five-point legislative program adopted by the convention included support for educational television in Oregon and for legislation designed to meet the

needs of higher education within the association program; it provided support for selection of qualified women for state boards, committees and commissions; included support for the reorganization of Oregon school districts, better teaching facilities, protection of basic school support. It also asked for the improvement of public library services in Oregon.

The convention also took steps to see that AAUW "acts as one group" on matters of state legislation, and the number of branches required to initiate a poll of all branches on some controversial issue was raised from three to five.

During Wednesday's dinner new by-laws were adopted after a final reading by Mrs. Anderson. The branch will not meet again until fall.
