Dallas, Tex.—Senate Majority Leader Lyndon B. Johnson asking loyalist Democrats not to fire the conservative state Democratic Executive committee:

"I don't think we ought to set the bad example of throwing people out of party office more than three months before their terms have expired."

Washington—Rep. Clarence Cannon (D-Mo.) chairman of the House Appropriations committee on the Army-Air force feud: "It should be subject to public sentiment instead of handled in a carefully-insulated room in the Pentagon."

Newark, England—British Foreign Secretary Selwyn Lloyd urging the West to overhaul the NATO military machine: "The Russian steamroller of today is not likely to be a military one."

Naples, Italy—Former President Harry Truman endorsing the foreign policy of the Eisenhower administration: "I wish everybody on the other side had done the same for me."

Washington—Maj. Gen. Howard McC. Snyder, President Eisenhower's physician, on whether the Chief Executive should vacation in the high altitude of Colorado this summer: "I would not be in favor of it . . . I would prefer to play it on the conservative side."

Miami—Adlai Stevenson on the H-bomb explosion: "The United States must turn to more peaceful uses of atomic power to stave off a future of total incineration and destruction."

MORE PENNIES, NICKELS

Washington—(U.P.)—The House Monday unanimously passed and sent to the Senate a bill to provide more pennies and nickels. It would boost from \$2,000,000 to \$3,000,000 the revolving fund which finances the production of one-cent and five-cent pieces. The increase is needed to cover a rise in copper prices.

Neuberger Asks Consideration for Family Allowance

New York—(U.P.)—Sen. Richard L. Neuberger (D-Ore.) charged today that the United States thinks "too much of dollars and too little of suffering."

He called for a five-point health, welfare and conservation program to preserve the human and natural resources of America.

Neuberger's address was read to the opening session of the National Tuberculosis Association by his wife.

The Oregon senator suggested that consideration be given to a family allowance program, such as that operating in Canada, which provides a government allowance for the health and welfare of each child under 16. Such a program has been described as "socialistic," Neuberger said, but it apparently has not deterred U. S. capitalists who presently own "over 25 per cent of all the industries of Canada and are continuing their investment."

Neuberger said a nation which spends \$10,000,000,000 a year for liquor and \$5,000,000,000 for tobacco can hardly plead poverty in face of the nation's health demands.

Roosevelt Confirms Plan for Wedding

Los Angeles—(U.P.)—Rep. James Roosevelt (D-Calif.) Monday confirmed published reports he would marry a secretary in his Washington offices when his divorce from his second wife becomes final next month.

The 49-year-old eldest son of the late president had refused until Monday to comment on reports he planned to marry Mrs. Gladys Irene Owens, 39, his divorcee from Mrs. Romelle Roosevelt becomes final in June.

Mrs. Roosevelt, a former nurse, originally had named Mrs. Owens as a correspondent in a 1954 divorce suit in which she charged Roosevelt with being intimate with several women. Mrs. Roosevelt however, later dropped the charges and won a divorce on an amended complaint.

Jasper, Wis.—(U.P.)—Mayor Ed Lorey asked today for a volunteer jury to try Odilo Terwiske on his fifth charge of drunken driving. Terwiske crossed up the mayor by pleading innocent. The city court doesn't have enough money to pay a jury.
