# Portland Raid Held Illegal

**Portland** — (U.P.) — The hearing in the court of District Judge John R. Mears on a petition to return evidence seized by Multnomah county police in a raid last week came to a stormy close yesterday afternoon.

**Judge Mears** ruled that the wire recordings of alleged illegal telephone taps be turned over to the attorney general and that the "one armed hand" slot machines seized in the same raid be destroyed.

**In effect**, the ruling by Judge Mears labeled the raid conducted last Thursday on the home of Raymond F. Clark to be illegal because District Attorney William Langley obtained his warrant on a faulty affidavit.

**The decision** by Judge Mears followed a conference between himself and Attorney General Robert Y. Thornton, who then appeared in the court in the roll of an assistant until the order was made.

**Judge Mears** also ordered that any copies made of the wire recordings should be turned over to the Attorney General.

**The ruling** by Judge Mears ordered Sheriff Terry Schunk to impound the wire recordings and later turn them over to Thornton, who, on the order of Gov. Elmo Smith, has stepped in to investigate conditions here.

They retired and moved to Pacific Grove in 1935, where she became active in the Presbyterian church there as a leader in women's and missionary work, Bible classes, and service to members of the Armed Forces.

**She was stricken with a heart attack** about a month before her death.

**She leaves her husband**, a daughter, Mrs. Mary Angell House, Los Angeles; two sons, the Rev. John H. Angell, Morton, Minn., and Joseph W. Angell, Montgomery, Ala., who is in charge of the historical program of the Air Force and five grandchildren.
