

IC4A Meet Opens at NY

New York — (U.P.) — A total of 504 athletes from 52 colleges, including many Olympic hopefuls, took over Downing Stadium today for the opening events in the annual IC4A outdoor championships.

Trials in 12 events were on the opening program of the two-day meet, which will close Saturday with 16 championship contests.

Two of the most interesting duels anticipated are a meeting between Villanova's Ran Delany and Pitt's Arnie Sowell in the 880-yard run, and another clash between Villanova's Charley Jenkins and Penn's John Haines in the 440.

Two Victories
Haines, one of the nation's top dash men, already holds two victories over Duke's record-busting Dave Sime, who was forced to bypass this meet because of examinations. But the Penn speedster decided to skip the defense of his 100-yard title for a crack at Jenkins in the 440.

Haines also will enter the 220 and here, too, he will be running against tough competition, headed by defending champion Art Pollard of Penn State. Delany, who will compete for Ireland in the Olympics, also will be aiming for two titles. He isn't given much of a chance against Sowell in the 880 but will be a heavy favorite in the mile run.

Schmidt To Receive Evidence on Trojans

Los Angeles — (U.P.) — Pacific Coast Conference Commissioner Victor O. Schmidt today was expected to receive the "documentary evidence" reportedly securing the University of Southern California with paying \$71,325 to 60 athletes in the last two years.

Schmidt returned here yesterday from the historical PCC session in which UCLA was hit with a heavy fine and the Bruin football ruled ineligible for a year.

The commission had no comment on charges by J. Miller Leavy, UCLA alumnus and deputy district attorney, that a USC alumni group supplied Trojan athletes with extra funds. It was over illegal pay to athletes that UCLA received its slapping from the PCC.

Could Call Meeting
Leavy said he had compiled "documentary evidence" and sent it to Schmidt's office here.

"If the charges are substantiated by an investigation of my office that warrant a special conference meeting, it could be called," Schmidt said after arriving here from Victoria, B.C. He said, however, he had not received the document and would

not comment on it. Meanwhile, the mystery organization accused by Leavy of paying Trojan athletes was identified as the Southern California Educational Foundation. Records on file with the corporation division of the county clerk's office disclosed the payments but names of the recipients were withheld from public viewing.

The clerk's office said the foundation was founded as a non-profit corporation in 1949 and listed as its incorporators 28 prominent citizens including Superior Court Judges Clement D. Nye and Clarence Kincaid.

Ducks Face Oregon State

Eugene — (U.P.) — Oregon, with only an outside chance at the Northern Division baseball title, met Oregon State here today in the first of a two-game series to wrap up the 1956 conference season.

The Ducks have an 8-4 record while Washington State, which has a 10-3 mark, meets Idaho twice Saturday. A double win would clinch the crown for the Cougars no matter what Oregon does.

Oregon and OSC play at Corvallis Saturday.

Portland — (U.P.) — High school baseball teams were in the midst of tourney play today for a shot at next Saturday's title games in Multnomah Stadium.

In the A-1 division, Grant travels to The Dalles for a night game with the defending state champs; Central Catholic hosted McMinnville this afternoon, Lincoln plays North Salem here tonight, and Medford met Eugene at Eugene this afternoon.

In class A-2, two games were scheduled today and one tomorrow. Crater already is in the semi-finals, and will meet the winner of Saturday's Vale-Prineville game. Today's action matched Seaside against Newport at Seaside and Central against Canby at Monmouth.

Big 10 Has Bowl Vote

Minneapolis, Minn. — (U.P.) — The Big Ten was to settle today whether to renew its 10-year Rose Bowl contract with the Pacific Coast Conference for an indefinite period.

Both faculty representatives and athletic directors were to vote at the annual spring meeting to determine whether to accept the Pacific Coast Conference's invitation to continue the pact.

It was the second vote on the invitation, and there was no doubt the bid would be accepted. The conference voted in Lansing, Mich., in March at the winter meeting to accept the pact, 7-3.

But because the acceptance involved waiver of the league rule against post-season competition, the faculty group of each member also had to approve. Minnesota rejected the pact to force the new vote.

Northwest Fines Levied

Portland — (U.P.) — Fighting in the Northwest league has been evaluated at \$10 a fight, according to fines levied by President James M. Fleishman in a fracas staged recently by Wenatchee and Tri-City.

Managers Edo Vanni of Wenatchee and Don Pries of Tri-City were assessed \$50. They also were advised that they could levy a fine of \$10 on each of the five players on each club who became involved in individual fights during the scrap.

Jake Lasby and Mill Martin were suspended for one game and fined \$20. Lasby catches for Wenatchee and Martin for Tri-City.

All Northwest league teams must get within the player limit of 18 by May 27, says Fleishman. The teams are permitted 16 players each plus two from the military. Five veterans are permitted on each team.

Restelli Chosen Klamath Skipper

Klamath Falls — (U.P.) — Dino Restelli, former major league and Pacific Coast league outfielder, has been signed to manage the Klamath Falls semi-pro baseball club.

Restelli is expected to play first base for Klamath Falls.

Adenauer, Aides Debate Inflation

Bonn, Germany — (U.P.) — Chancellor Konrad Adenauer was deadlocked in disagreement with his top economic aides today on how to block West Germany's mounting threat of inflation.

They failed to resolve their differences at a five hour cabinet meeting Thursday night and said they would have to hold another session. They did not say when.

Adenauer called the emergency session to lay down a straight government policy line on measures to prevent the business boom from breaking into runaway inflation.

He ran into opposition from Economic Minister Ludwig Erhard, Finance Minister Fritz Scheffer and the Bank Deutscher Laender, West Germany's central note-issuing bank.

An uninformative communique issued after the meeting admitted the cabinet failed to reach agreement and said the discussion would continue at a later date.

Willamette's Caruso Impressive in Hitting

Salem, May 22 — Vic Dacklund, sophomore from Bandon, topped the Willamette university baseball club in hitting during the luckless 1956 season with a .389 average, according to figures released this week.

Backlund poked 14 hits in 36 trips and Tom Moore, freshman from Portland ranked next with 20 hits for 52 trips and .385.

But most impressive swatsman in the Bearcat ranks was Frank Caruso, freshman from Olympia, Wash. At bat 80 times the slugging third-sacker banged out a high hit total of 28, led in runs batted in with 22, was tops in runs scored with 19 and also paced the home run department with five boundary belts.



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
