

Man Injured When Log Rolls From Truck

Charles Walden, 37, of 2671 Table Rock rd., is reported in

fair condition today at Osteopathic hospital where he was taken about 3 p.m., Thursday by Medford ambulance attendants after a log from the truck he was driving rolled off and struck him, according to ambulance attendants reports.

Walden had left a loading platform and had stopped to tighten a binder chain.

Apparently a small log rolled off and hit him, according to reports. He laid at the scene of the accident for about two hours before someone found him, according to a hospital report.

He received a badly cut hand, a broken little finger, and multiple cuts and bruises. The accident occurred on Sugar Pine creek about 12 miles up Elk creek, near Trail.

Second Insect Spray Date About June 15

Cliff B. Cordy, county horticulture agent, today said the application date for the second insect spray cover on fruit trees in this area will be sometime about June 15.

He explained that the spray application date would depend on activity of insects principally psylla.

The county agent added that fruit is growing rapidly in the area and weather conditions have been "excellent" for growing. Cordy said there were some reports of scab on fruit tree leaves, but explained this condition as not serious commercially unless the scab reaches the fruit.

State Taxpayers League Founder Dies at Age 67

Vancouver, Wash.—(UP)—Peter Lloyd Cover, 67, founder of the organization that eventually became the Taxpayers League of Oregon, died in a local hospital yesterday.

Cover, who came to Oregon in 1905, had lived here since 1950.

In 1932 he was active in the founding of the East Side Taxpayers League in Portland. The organization later grew into the larger group.

Cover was in the restaurant and ice cream business in Astoria in the early 1920s.
