## National Forest Land Withdrawn at Boise

Washington — (U.P.) — The Interior Department announced Saturday that 2,135 acres of public lands in Boise National forest have been withdrawn for possible use for the Boise, Ida., reclamation project.

The land would be used for construction of the Garden Valley reservoir, reclamation commissioner W. A. Dexheimer said.

Studies have not been completed for the reservoir but present plans call for it to hold about 850,000 acre-feet of water. It would impound waters of the middle and south forks of the Payette river and regulate releases from existing cascades reservoir on the north fork.

**Chaplin Says His Break With U.S. 'Complete'**  
London — (U.P.) — Charlie Chaplin said Friday night his break with the United States is "complete and irrevocable" and he does not intend to return.

## Chicago University Hunch on Education Turns Out Correct

Chicago — (U.P.) — A University of Chicago hunch that students are better educated today than they were a dozen years ago has turned out to be right, according to the institution's survey.

The answer as to just how good the schools really are came out in a study conducted by the university's examiner, education Prof. Benjamin Bloom.

The tests were divided into five sections: English, social studies, natural sciences, interpretation of literary materials and mathematics.

Contrary to a lot of criticism on methods of teaching math, the most improvement was noted in that subject. In 1955, the average high school senior tested in mathematics did better than 58 per cent of the students in 1943.

The least improvement was noted in social studies, where today's average senior was only better than 52 per cent of the students tested in 1943. For all five subjects, the scale has shifted upward by about five per cent.

**Differences in States**  
Bloom's findings, however, showed drastic differences in educational achievement among the states. Eighty per cent of the students in the best state were superior in the tests to the average student in the worst.

Bloom also found a close correlation between the amount of money the states spend per pupil in their school systems and their ranking in educational achievement.

Equally marked were differences in college attendance. In the nation, about one-quarter of the high school graduates go on to college. In the bottom third of the states, only 19 per cent had the national average of students going to college.

Nationally, about 16 per cent of all draftees are rejected by the armed services for educational reasons. Of the 15 lowest states in the tests, all but two had more than the national average of draft rejections and therefore contributed less than their proportionate share to the armed forces, Bloom said.

He concluded that pupils in the states which ranked low are hampered in obtaining admission to top-ranking colleges and universities. If they do go on to higher education, these graduates may require remedial work. Such graduates also are handicapped in their competition for jobs if they have to compete with students from states with better educational systems, and they may be retarded in their cultural and social opportunities, Bloom said.

In 1955, tests were given to five per cent of the nation's high school students, a total of 39,000 from every state. More than 814 high schools, distributed by area and by size, participated. The tests were given to students in Negro, vocational, evening, or two-year high schools.

In order to provide a scale of educational achievement by students after 12 years spent in the American educational system, the tests were given to high school seniors in their last two months before graduation.

Since 1943, several million students have taken the tests, Bloom said. In 1955, the standards of the tests were raised because of the feeling that educational standards had improved.

## UAW Local Calls Rally for Workers

Detroit — (U.P.) — A United Auto Workers local will hold a rally for jobless auto workers today with the aim of getting government action that will relieve growing unemployment in the industry.

UAW Dodge Local 3, which has 26,000 members and "just about half of them unemployed," has invited Gov. G. Mennen Williams, U. S. Sen. Patrick McNamara (D-Mich.), Mayor Albert E. Cobo and Cong. Thaddeus M. Marchonowicz (D-Mich.) to speak. All are expected to do so.

"We want some action or at least something that will give these workers some hope," Local President Joseph Cheal said. "I think we'll have more than a half-full — and the hall holds 1,000."

Cheal said he hoped UAW President Walter P. Reuther would attend, but Reuther was not feeling well and might not attend.

During the week the department found the cost of living had increased enough to give auto workers a cent an hour increase under automatic provisions adjusting wages to cost of living.

Thus, General Motors and Ford employees will get seven cents an hour more next week, the one-cent cost of living plus six cents progressive raise written into the 1955 contracts. Chrysler workers got this six cents in April.

## Randolph Holds Lead In Ballot Canvassing

Indianapolis, Ind. — (U.P.) — Woodruff Randolph appeared to have won a seventh term as president of the International Typographical union as official canvassing of ballots began Saturday.

Randolph held a 9,661-vote lead over his opponent, Laurence Victory, New York, on the basis of unofficial returns from 662 of 785 local unions. About 7,500 ballots remain to be tallied.

Before the canvass began, Randolph had a total of 42,079 votes and Victory had 32,418.

Don Hurd, secretary-treasurer, said the official results will not be announced until the canvass is completed May 31 or June 1.

But a spokesman said it appeared likely Randolph would lead his entire "Progressive" party state to a win over Victory, heads the "Independent" party.

## American Wrestler Sentenced in Japan

Tokyo — (U.P.) — A Japanese court Saturday convicted John M. MacFarland, 30, an American professional wrestler, of robbing Tokyo's Imperial hotel of \$13,000 last January. He was sentenced to eight years in prison.

MacFarland arrived in Japan late last year to make a professional wrestling appearance.
