Catholic Sister Named Superior Of Church Order

Sister M. Mark, faculty member of St. Mary's High school in Medford during the current year, has been named to the highest position of her community in the Northwest. As provincial superior with headquarters at Maryhurst, near Portland, she will have jurisdiction over the 53 educational establishments of the Sisters of the Holy Names in Oregon and Washington.

A total of 17,202 students are enrolled in the two colleges, nine high schools, 41 elementary schools and a nursery school. An additional 5520 pupils were taught last summer in the annual religious vacation schools conducted principally in rural areas by the Sisters of the Holy Names.

Now called Mother Mary Mark, the new provincial superior is the former Miss Margaret Myers, a native of LaGrande, Ore. She is the sister of Paul F. Meyers of Medford. Another brother is Alfred L. Meyers of San Francisco, and her sister is Miss Dorothy Meyers, a teacher in Port Townsend high school. Mother M. Mark has been superior of schools conducted by her community in Astoria, The Dalles, Portland and Seattle. She entered the novitiate in 1932.

During the nine-year term of her predecessor, Mother M. Joan, the number of Sisters increased 24 per cent to the present total of 843 in the province. Pupil enrollment jumped 50 per cent.
