

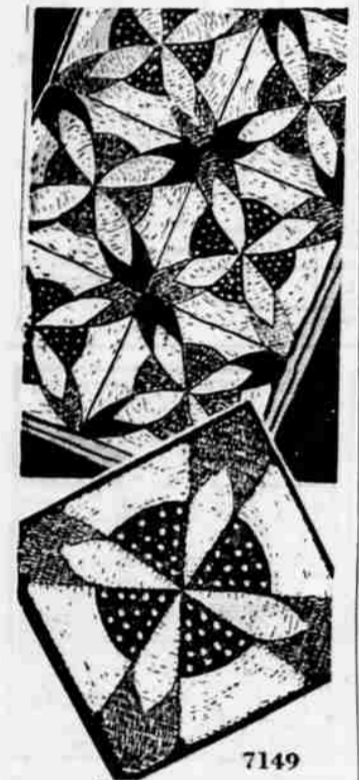
Girl Scouts Hold Court At School

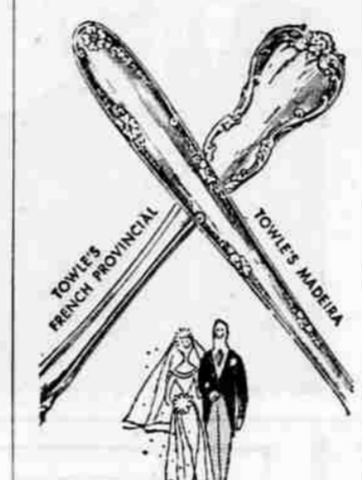
The group will convene first at 7 p.m. for a business meeting and Mr. Demo's talk will begin at 8:45 p.m.
