### Kefauver, Adlai Wind Up Florida Campaign; Symington, Supported

Washington —(U.P.)— The two active Democratic presidential candidates wound up their Florida primary campaigns today while Missouri Democrats assembled to put a potentially formidable dark horse in the field. In Florida, Sen. Estes Kefauver and Adlai E. Stevenson were at the end of a rugged state campaign in which they were bidding for votes in Tuesday's presidential primary. Twenty-eight national convention votes will be at stake. Stevenson was scheduled to leave Miami this morning for

### Mistrial Ordered For Schwimmer

St. Louis —(U.P.)— A mistrial was declared today in the trial of Harry I. Schwimmer, accused of conspiring with two former Truman administration officials to fix a tax case. Federal Judge Rubey M. Hulen ordered the mistrial in Schwimmer's case after two physicians testified. Schwimmer's life would be in jeopardy if he continued on trial. Hulen overruled motions to declare mistrials in the cases of the other defendants. The jury was called into the court and the presentation of the government's evidence resumed. Charles Margiotti, counsel for T. Lamar Caudle, former head of the Justice Department's tax division, moved to have a mistrial declared also in Caudle's case. Margiotti claimed the cases of Schwimmer and Caudle were intertwined. John Lashly, attorney for Matthew J. Connelly, former White House aide to former President Harry S. Truman, also requested a mistrial.

### Alexander Wiley Seeks Fourth Term

Madison, Wis. —(U.P.)— Veteran Sen. Alexander Wiley set out today to win a fourth term in the face of a party revolt and the surprise candidacy of a young congressman who has never been beaten. The 72-year-old Republican came back fighting after the state GOP convention, in a dramatic turnabout, refused to endorse him for renomination in Milwaukee Saturday. "I have never been more confident," Wiley told the United Press as he set out to win the party's September primary over 41-year-old Rep. Glenn Davis, the convention's choice. "The voters of Wisconsin will elect a senator, not a few king-makers," he said. On the morning after his convention defeat, Wiley said, "before I got out of bed, county chairmen were calling me. Many said the convention's action means 100,000 more votes in the primary." Davis conceded he is in for a tough battle against the Chipewa Falls veteran.

### Slayer of Policeman Succumbs in Hospital

Portland —(U.P.)— Ralph Pyatt, 36-year-old Bandon mill worker wounded in a gun battle with a state policeman May 8, died in a local hospital last night. He had not regained consciousness since wounded May 8 by State Policeman Richard O'Connor who died of wounds. The officer had gone to serve a misdemeanor warrant on Pyatt at the logger's cabin near Bandon when he was shot. He managed to crawl to a window and wound Pyatt in the head. The logger was brought here the next day. Lake Superior is 21 feet higher than Lakes Michigan and Huron.

### Mollet Government Faces Tough Week

Paris —(U.P.)— Socialist Premier Guy Mollet and his government headed into the toughest week of their ministry today faced with a worsening situation in Algeria. Political observers believe they will pull through because nobody else wants the job. Mollet has arranged for a debate on government policy to start on Thursday in the National Assembly. He hopes this will wind up in his being given what the French press is calling "a second investiture vote." In fact it will be a vote of confidence in him and his government now that radical leader Pierre Mendes-France has quit. Mendes-France resigned his post of minister of state and deputy prime minister last week because of differences over the policy to be followed in Algeria. But he persuaded the 13 other radical ministers to stay on. Mollet's problem, as far as the National Assembly is concerned, has been to achieve a majority with a permanent minority following. To do this he has had to rely on the 150 Communist votes in the Assembly, although he has not solicited them. He has repeatedly turned down Red proposals of a "popular front" with the Communists, although their votes swept him into office.

### Baseball Official Beaten by Youths

Portland —(U.P.)— Richard Rankin, 40, an official in Portland's Little League baseball program, was released from the hospital yesterday, with a heavy cast on his hip and a broken ankle as a result of injuries he received from a gang of youths at a ball game last week. Little League officials were scheduled to meet with Mayor Fred L. Peterson today to ask protection for their games. Lou Wallman, district representative of the league, said that Rankin had attempted to stop the youths from disrupting the game at the park when they attacked him. Wallman estimated the youths were 18 and 19 years old.

### Fire Truck On Way To False Alarm Hits Car

Portland —(U.P.)— A Portland fire truck en route to answer a false alarm collided with a car in Portland yesterday afternoon, sending a mother and her young daughter to the hospital. Injured in the collision were Mrs. William D. Burris, Vancouver, Wash., and her six-year-old daughter, Susan. The woman's husband, driver of the car, and another child escaped injury. Police reported they had obtained a vague description of a suspect who pulled the alarm that sent fire equipment rushing to a location in the northwest part of the city.

### Fire Wrecks Building Surrounded by Water

Portland —(U.P.)— A two-alarm fire early today caused an estimated \$100,000 damage to a building at the former Oregon shipyard's site north of the St. Johns district. Firemen said the 120-by-250-foot structure was surrounded by floodwaters and pumps were called to pull water. The building was reported being used as a storage warehouse. The first alarm was turned in at 1:34 a.m. and the second at 1:51 a.m. The blaze was visible from many sections of the city. Bumps on the backs of cattle in the spring may be caused by grubs or warbles. These pests reduce meat and milk production.

### More Time Needed For Canvass of Votes

Salem —(U.P.)— From two to three weeks more will be required to complete the canvass of Oregon's May 18 primary vote, Dave O'Hara, state elections chief, said today. O'Hara said the state canvass of those for delegate-at-large, the elections chief said. He said no serious errors had been discovered so far. O'Hara said the next important election date was July 5 when petitions for initiative measures for the November general elections must be filed with the state election division.
