Sacramento, Calif. (U.P.) — California's licensed fur catch was worth \$144,600 during the past season, 56 per cent greater than last year.

The increased value was reported by the department of fish and game and was attributed to higher buyer demand for short-haired furs such as muskrat, mink, beaver and river otter.
