

Edison Phonograph Will Be Displayed at Antique Show

The Edison phonograph which was used on the Dalles City passenger steamship in daily runs from Portland to The Dalles in 1906 will be on display at the Chin Up club's antique show and sale in the Pioneer room of the Jackson hotel Friday and Saturday. Show hours are from 11 a. m. to 9 p. m. daily.

Cylinder records for use on the machine also will be on display, to be shown by Mrs. C. L. English, antique dealer from Clackamas. The table model machine has a sapphire needle which picks up vibrations and relays them through a two-foot horn, Mrs. English said.

With coming of the automobile and faster travel, Tom Shephard, owner, captain and commander of the ship was forced to sell the vessel since it no longer was a paying enterprise. It was then converted into a barge and plied the Columbia river for several years, according to Mrs. English. The barge was dismantled at Longview, Wash., during World War II.

Mrs. English said the bell used in the engine room of the Dalles City also will be on display.

Dealers from several western Oregon communities will display at the show, which is open to the public. Receipts will be used by the Chin Up club to purchase equipment for use by handicapped persons.

Demurrer Sustained In Lane County Case

Salem — (U.P.) — The State Supreme Court yesterday afternoon sustained a demurrer by Lane County Circuit Judge Frank B. Reid in a decision which put an end to District Attorney Eugene C. Venn's efforts to disband the present Lane county grand jury as "illegally constituted."

Chief Justice Harold J. Warner said vote on the case was 4-3 with Justices Hall S. Lusk, James Brand and George Rossman dissenting. He said an opinion would follow at a later date.

Judge Reid's demurrer was filed in answer to a writ of mandamus issued two weeks ago. Venn had earlier filed a petition demanding that Judge Reid disband the present grand jury and call a new one.

Hearing on Plywood Plant Union Held

A national labor relations board hearing examiner took testimony here yesterday on a proposal for the unionization of the plywood plant at Timber Products company.

The hearing was held in the federal court room in the Post Office building. Another hearing, involving the unionization of the Oak Street Steel and Tank company, Ashland, scheduled for yesterday afternoon, was postponed.

The proposal of the International Woodworkers of America, CIO, was for an NLRB election among employees of the plywood plant on union representation. Timber Products company, however, argued that the plywood plant is an integral part of the firm's operation and is not a suitable unit for representation, and that if such an election is held it should be for the entire sawmill-plywood operation.

Representing the union at the hearing were Tim Sullivan, local president, and Leonard Summers, Portland, an IWA organizer. Timber Products company was represented by T. K. Oliver, company manager.

The hearing officer will make his recommendations to the NLRB, which will decide whether an election should cover the plywood plant only, or the combined operation.

Florida Negroes Demand Seating On City Buses

Tallahassee, Fla. — (U.P.) — Tallahassee Negroes demanded "first come first served" seating on city buses today as a boycott begun by protesting Negro university students slowly spread throughout the city.

"We would like, of course, to see integration on the buses, but we're not pulling at that bone now," said the Rev. C. K. Steele, local president of the National Association for Advancement of Colored People.

"But we do want seating on a first come first served basis and not have our tired people standing up looking at empty seats," Negro leaders, representing the Inter-Civil Council, put their demands before City Manager Arvah Hopkins, Mayor Fred Winterle and C. L. Carter, manager of Cities Transit, Inc. The city and bus officials took the matter under advisement and declined comment.

Carter claims the boycott, now in its third day, has not affected bus revenues or passenger loads, even though Negroes compose 60 to 65 per cent of total riders. He said the usual number of Negroes is riding, with the exception of A. and M. university students.

Steele admitted many Negroes rode the buses yesterday and some were waiting at the regular bus stops today "but that is because we weren't organized and they didn't know where else to go for transportation."

The boycott followed the arrest of two Negro students who took seats beside a white woman, only two left on the bus. The girls said they asked for their money back when the driver ordered them to stand, but the driver called police and they were charged with placing themselves in a position to cause a riot.
