Chastain said Misk's wife, Donnis, discovered her husband about 9 a.m. in a reclining position in the rear of his 1946 ranchwagon.

The police chief said Misk had apparently been contemplating suicide for some time. He had taken his wife to work earlier in the morning. She returned home after becoming worried about him and placing a phone call to his physician, Dr. Alvin Roberts.

Misk was pronounced dead at 9:20 a.m. Oregon state police, the Jackson county sheriff's office, Medford police and Coroner Carlos W. Morris were called in on the case.

Soviet Diplomat Said Spy Recruiter

Washington (U.P.)—The Senate Internal Security Subcommittee today disclosed testimony that Sergei Tichvinski, new head of the Soviet diplomatic mission in Japan, is a high ranking Russian intelligence officer who once recruited Japanese prisoners of war as Red espionage agents.

The testimony was given by Yuri Rastvorov, former Soviet secret police officer who defected to the West in Tokyo in 1954.

At a closed session earlier this week, Rastvorov told the subcommittee that Tichvinski served as an intelligence officer "under diplomatic cover" in China for 10 years, approximately 1940 to 1950.

During part of that time, Rastvorov said, Tichvinski was engaged in recruiting Japanese prisoners of war and internees who were sent back to their homeland "to carry on intelligence work for the Soviet Union."

He said Tichvinski had been assigned to the Soviet Embassy in Peking and was counselor of the embassy there toward the end of his China career.

Safety Council Warns Bloodiest Year Ahead

Chicago (U.P.)—The National Safety Council warned today that the nation is rolling towards the bloodiest year on its highways in history.

If the death rate doesn't stop, the council said, it will reach an all-time record of 42,000 by the end of 1956. The previous record was 39,969 in 1941.

Wall Street

New York (U.P.)—Strength in chemicals and weakness in coppers featured an irregularly higher stock market today.

Trading fell off sharply from the Tuesday session during which the market made its best gains since last Sept. 27.

Today's advance centered on the industrials which rose despite the dip in coppers. There is only one copper in the industrial average, American Smelting, which held steady. Anaconda and Kennecott lost two points at the worst. Magna and Phelps Dodge declined a point and Cerro de Pasco more than a point.

Sale of Properties At North Bend Told

North Bend, Ore.—(U.P.)—Sale of the motor vessel Coos Bay and other properties of the Irwin-Lyons interests here, including sawmill, planning mill and dock, to Al Pierce Company was announced today.

Pierce said he would continue to operate the ship, planning mill and dock but would dismantle the sawmill, a North Bend landmark. Cash consideration was not announced.

The Coos Bay is a converted LST which carries cargoes of lumber to California ports. One of the former owners was killed in a 1953 hunting accident and the other died last year. Operation since has been in the hands of others of the Irwin and Lyons families.
