

Case of Missing Trujillo Critic Being Studied

New York — (U.P.) — The district attorney's office is investigating a Dominican revolutionary's charge that a missing critic of the Trujillo government was thrown alive into the boiler furnace of a ship in New York harbor.

The missing man, Dr. Jesus De Galindez, vanished March 12. He had just completed a book which severely criticizes the government of Generalissimo Rafael Trujillo in the Dominican Republic and charges the leader with corruption and terrorism.

Nicholas Silfa, 41, a spokesman for the Dominican Revolutionary Party in exile here, told New York authorities Tuesday he had been told that Galindez died in the furnace of the freighter Fundacion, owned by the Dominican government.

Silfa said members of the ship's crew and sources in the Trujillo government who are collaborating with the New York exiles said Galindez had been burned alive.

The district attorney's office said it has subpoenaed the books and records of the New York and Cuba Mail Steamship Company, agents for the Dominican line. Authorities said they planned to question members of the Fundacion's crew when it docks in New York again June 7, but it was reported the crew had been changed since the ship left last March 17.

Silfa, who said that he had received threatening telephone calls, charged that Generalissimo Trujillo ordered Galindez' execution and also ordered the execution of two others here in New York and two more in Havana.

Mrs. R.L.M. — Our daughter Janice has frightened us with the kind of marriage she wants to make.

She has always been very glamor-conscious, fussing about clothes and dates and reading all the stage, movie and TV news. Now, quite suddenly she wants to marry a young man just out of the Army who intends to run a small farm in another part of the country.

She met this boy while visiting her brother at an Army camp. The two boys were friendly and, before I knew it, the young man and Janice had become close friends.

He is very handsome and I can understand the attraction. But Janice hasn't the least idea of the kind of life she would have to lead on a small farm. I'm afraid it would be tragic for both of them, but Janice will not listen to reason.

Janice — It is my mother who will not listen to reason. I know what I am doing. My fiancée is no peasant. He has had a year in agricultural college and intends to finish. He saved his money in the Army and he also has a little his grandfather left him. He has ideas for running his farm and for an outside business associated with it, and I will be able to help him with the clerical work.

The Council: Janice's mother is allowing herself to be frightened by the word "farm." Things have changed a great deal in the past generation. Nowadays, a great many farms have all the convenience of a good city home, and an easier, more relaxed home atmosphere.

Janice's fiancée evidently is no mere farm laborer. He would appear to be an ambitious, intelligent and imaginative person, capable of making Janice a happy and thoughtful husband.

It is a mistake to assume that a girl who yearns for glamour must forever confine herself to city streets. Sometimes this childhood trait can be one of several possible expressions of dissatisfaction with the ordinary and routine.

The prospect of a fine modern farm and an associated business may now have more glamor for Janice than the movie stars had in her childhood.

Mrs. R.L.M. is right in being suspicious of her physical attraction. That can certainly mislead young people. In this case, however, the anxious mother should consider some of the words Janice uses in describing her fiancée: "politest, kindest and most charming gentleman — no peasant — he saved his money — he has ideas —"

Hollywood — (U.P.) — On an NBC-TV rehearsal stage, a handsome actress patted her black cane and smiled, "For what I've gained, I'd go through all of this again."

Fans of veteran screen and stage actress Marjorie Rambeau did not realize her legs were damaged in an automobile accident 11 years ago until her life was aired on TV's sentimental show, "This Is Your Life."

Today the actress told how she's managed to build a new career and continue to act despite her cane and specially-built shoes. Her handicap, she thinks, actually has improved her life.

Something Lacking

"Before the accident something was lacking in my life," she reflected. "I had reached the peak of my profession but an understanding of life was missing. Now I have it."

Miss Rambeau was injured in 1945 and was "in ghastly pain." After several operations doctors told her she would never walk without crutches.

Director Irving Rapper induced her to return to the screen in "Forever Female." She appeared in "Torch Song" sitting on a couch. She started "A Man Called Peter" on crutches — but was so moved by one of Richard Todd's sermons that she walked without them during a scene.

The actress refuses to let her handicap spoil any jobs for her. She merely informs the director she won't be able to "run up stairs or anything like that." For her role on the Lux Video Theater tonight she uses a wheelchair as part of her characterization.

"But I refused to have any publicity photos of me taken in

the chair or people would say Rambeau's in a wheelchair," she laughed.

Acting has helped her morale because "before I had the idea my accident was shameful."

"I would try to hide my crutch. I was so embarrassed when I would stumble. I was ashamed of my shoes," she said. "Returning to acting gave me confidence. Now I have much more tolerance for people. When I ask them, 'How are you?' I mean it now."

"Next thing you know, 'they'll have me swinging from a trapeze. Nothing will stop me," she said firmly.

Linfield Increases PS Major Study Area

McMinnville — Political science department of Linfield college in McMinnville has been raised to a major area of study by action of the college curriculum committee and faculty. Department chairman is Dr. Geraldine Garlick who came to Linfield in 1955 from the University of Iowa.

Richard John Maroney, 44, had stopped to check a load of logs he was hauling when apparently the brake on his tractor slipped. The tractor rolled back, pulling Maroney into the machine, crushing him between the truck and the cab.

Supplement to Brand Book Ready June 4

Salem — The first supplement to the 1955 Oregon livestock brand book will be available June 4. Roy K. Nelson, brand inspection supervisor for the state department of agriculture who directed the supplement's compilation, has announced.

A total of 1000 new brands recorded with the department between March 1, 1955, and Jan. 1, 1956, are included in the supplement, bringing the grand total of Oregon brands recorded with the department to 12,500, with no two identical.

Strategic Singapore Colony Moves Toward Freedom

Washington — Singapore, the sprawling City of the Lion, commands one of the world's strategic crossroads.

Ships of all maritime nations pass in the busy Strait of Singapore where seas meet at the southernmost tip of Asia, midway between India and China. The city itself stands on a pleasant green island of 220 square miles dangling like a diamond-shaped pendant from the mainland. This location has brought trade and vast wealth to the city.

As heart of the British Crown Colony of Singapore, the hot and humid seaport presents a British facade. Men in sun-drenched white play cricket on a waterfront green, near pillar government buildings and Victorian business houses. However, the colony has been moving rapidly toward self-rule in recent years. Now it seeks full independence.

Behind its staid facade, the city pulses with Oriental life. Although geographically a part of the Malay Peninsula, to which the island is attached by a cause-

way, the city has always been overwhelmingly Chinese. Among some 830,000 residents, four out of five trace their ancestry to China.

There are miles of streets with small Chinese shops displaying fine jade and porcelain curios. Fluttering flaglike above the sidewalks are numerous family washes hanging from bamboo window poles.

Cosmopolitan is the word for Singapore. The passing parade includes Malay policemen, blond Europeans, dark-eyed Indian schoolgirls in vivid saris, burmese-swathed Arabs, Pakistanis in white fezzes, and petite Eurasian stenographers wearing chic western clothes.

But there has been little fusion of races. Each retains its own language, customs and religious practices, a fact which often gives visitors the sensation of being in several cities at the same time.

In Singapore's popular amusement parks — Happy World, Great World and New World —

merrymakers may buy an astonishing variety of products ranging from bird's-nest soup to Hawaiian shirts made in Japan. "Pride of the East"

Tradition says a Malay city of importance once stood on the tropical isle. It was called Singapura, Sanskrit for City of the Lion. Javanese warriors are said to have put the city to sword in the 14th century, spilling a river of blood.

Only a pirate-haunted jungle village remained when Sir Stamford Raffles landed in 1819. The far-sighted young employee of the East India Company recognized the potential of the magnificent harbor and persuaded the Sultan of Johore, who owned the island, to let him set up a trading post.

On the fringe of a steaming mangrove swamp Raffles founded his city, a free port "open to all ships and vessels of every nation." He envisioned Singapore as the "emporium and pride of the East."

Singapore grew and prospered as Malaya's riches — chiefly rubber and tin — poured through its natural gateway to the world.

Skyscrapers and housing projects are changing the complexion of Singapore — but the old flavor remains. Blending as one, the aromas of incense, Turkish coffee, fragrant tea, spices, curry and heavily ripe bananas send Singapore's own special perfume across the ship-filled harbor.

Development Group Studying Plan for Wood Utilization

Portland — The Oregon Development commission announced today it is working on a wood utilization plan that could benefit the state's economy by millions of dollars.

The plan should help small and medium sized lumber mills to realize higher log utilization while encouraging a sharp increase in pulp and paper production, according to ODC Chairman Joseph W. Smith of Portland.

Steps in the plan include:

Institute Studies

(1) Stanford Research institute studies in six Oregon areas to determine if sufficient wood residue and water are present to attract pulp and paper operations.

(2) In areas where these two ingredients of paper-making are found in adequate quantities, the commission will seek to block together small and medium sized lumber mills and sign them to long-term contracts. These agreements would guarantee to prospective pulp and paper mills the chipping materials they would need in lieu of sizeable tracts of standing timber.

(3) The ODC would then seek to induce outside pulp and paper interests to locate in the areas.

Smith explained that the program would help the lumber mills to reduce their raw materials costs and get into a stronger competitive position in the log market. Such mills are feeling the pinch because of the decreasing supplies of timber to which they have access, it was pointed out.

Smith disclosed that the commission already has obtained preliminary data on one of the six areas under consideration and that three eastern pulp and paper concerns "have expressed a lively interest in our findings."

The ODC chairman added: "Results of the SRI studies are expected to touch off the commission's greatest organizational and promotion job to date — a job that bids well to add a bright page to the story of Oregon's development."
