The Medical Roundup

Self-Limited Diseases
Since I have protested against the folly of going to ignorant and often criminal quacks who have had no training in medicine, I have received many letters from people who have been agereed or have said s a d l y "We thought you were a fine kindly man; how could you attack men who say they have cured thousands of people with cancer?" Several persons said that first they had been examined thoroughly by eminent physicians in a big university clinic. When these doctors failed to find anything wrong, the patient went to a quack who promptly, with practically no examination, diagnosed a cancer. He gave some medicine, and the person soon was well. Naturally, my correspondent felt that the unlearned quack must have had some skill that the highly-trained physicians at the university lacked.

I understand such reasoning, and I realize how almost hopeless it is for me, or anyone, to try to answer it successfully. What most lay persons do not know is that a large number of diseases are what we physicians call "self-limited." Like the chicken-pox, they tend sooner or later to clear up without any treatment. If it were not for the tremendous power of the body to heal itself and conquer infections, we physicians would have a hard time of it. Many a time, as a patient of mine has recovered, I have wondered if my medicine really helped. I have thought of that wonderful statement of the father of military surgery, Ambrose Pareo, who lived some 400 years ago. He used to say, "I dressed the soldier's wound, and God healed it."

Another fact that many—even of us physicians—forget is that

Prison Term for Beatty Man Upheld

Salem—U.P.—The Oregon Supreme Court has upheld a life prison sentence imposed on James Quinton Anderson of Beatty for the second degree murder of Richard Miller in 1954.

Miller was killed by a shotgun blast during a brawl. Anderson had claimed that he was convicted illegally because the Klamath county district attorney lacked jurisdiction to prosecute when the case was moved to Harney county and because Circuit Judge M. A. Biggs refused to instruct the jury on the theory of justifiable homicide. The high court rejected both claims.

In other decisions, the court upheld a \$20,000 judgment against the Los Angeles-Seattle Motor Express awarded to Joseph A. Hopper in Marion county circuit court. Hopper was injured when his car and a LASME truck collided. A Lane county circuit court judgment in favor of V. C. May was upheld in a case involving a charge of breach of oral contract brought by Edward J. Hearn. The entire court affirmed a previous ruling which gave Lawrence H. Flaherty \$5748 awarded in Multnomah county against Donald Bookhult and Albert W. Riley.

my head around so that I could see to back my car out of the garage, or I have been unable to close my right hand. Obviously, if I had been a layman without this knowledge that many attacks of arthritic pain tend to come and go, I would have taken medicine, and then when the pain had left me I would have been sure that I had found a wonderful treatment.

Nothing New in Remedy
I suppose a hundred times during my medical life, one of my old patients has come back to show me how he or she had been cured marvelously by some medicine which he had been led to believe was a new synthetic. Practically always, then, on pulling down my copy of the Physician's Desk Reference Book, showing the composition of all the new drugs on the market, I have found that my patient's

remedy contained nothing new. It was just a combination of two or three old drugs. The important constituent was aspirin, or perhaps sodium salicylate, the more runner of aspirin, which my doctor father used to give me 60 years ago, when I first had pain in my joints.

As I have said before in this column, many a time I have seen a woman whose very alarming disease was, I felt sure, pure hysteria, due primarily to a poor nervous inheritance, and secondarily to the strain of living with a mean husband whom she much disliked and either wanted to punish or to keep out of her bed. Often, the first day the woman came in with a paralyzed
