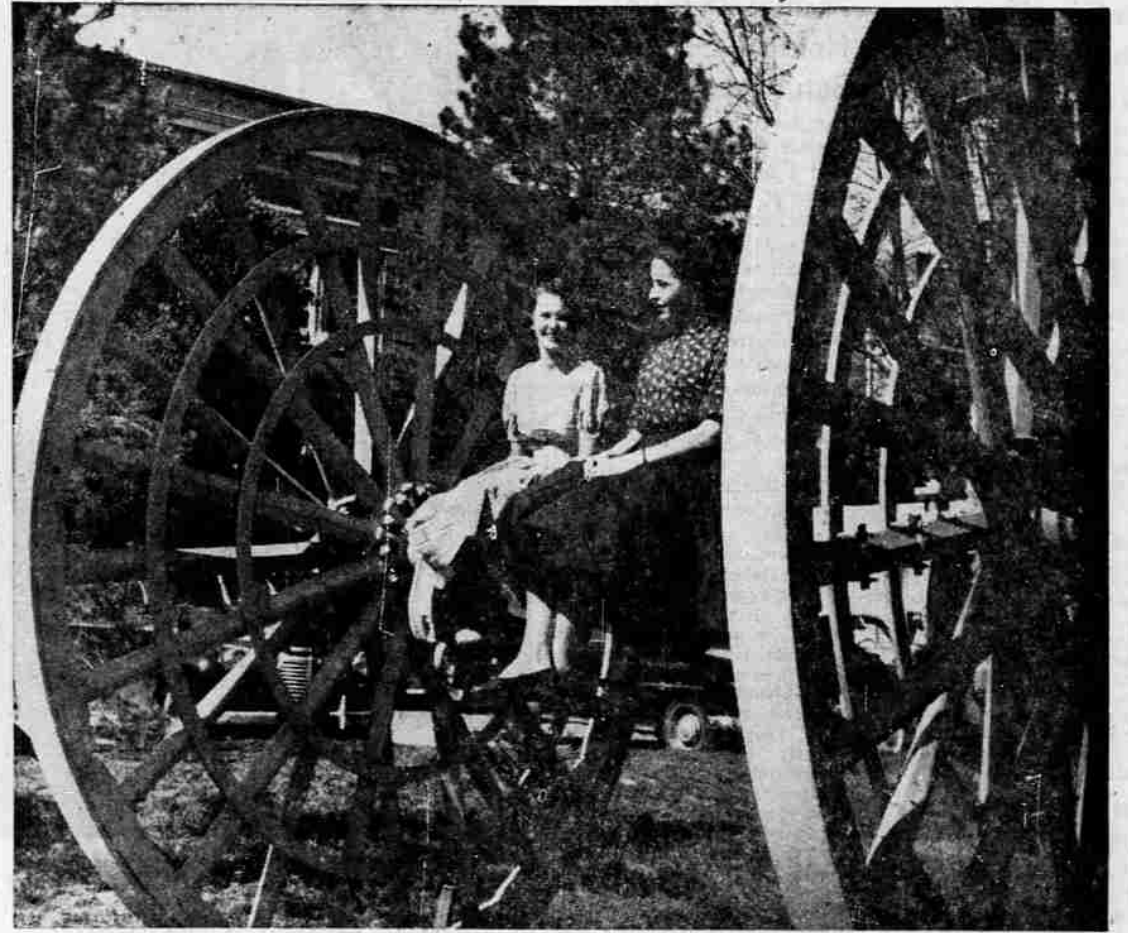

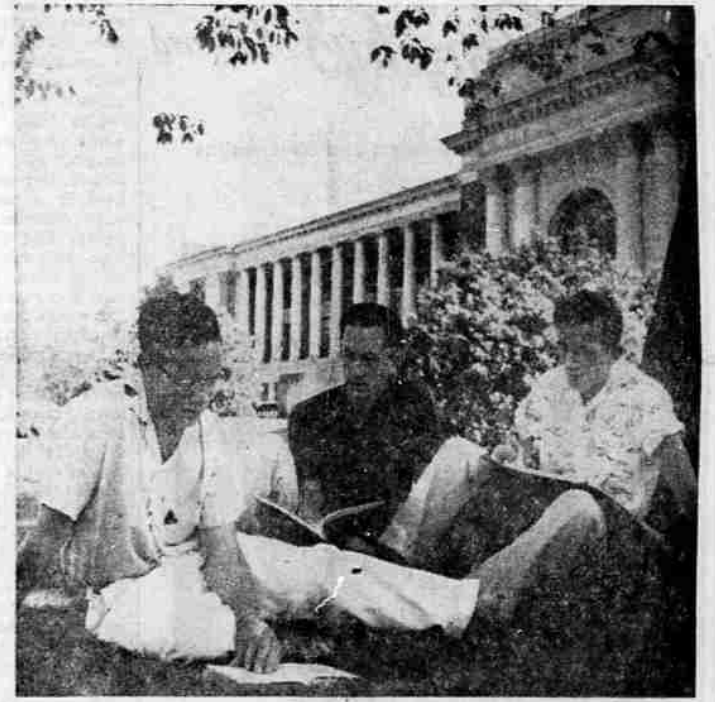
## Year Ending at OSC



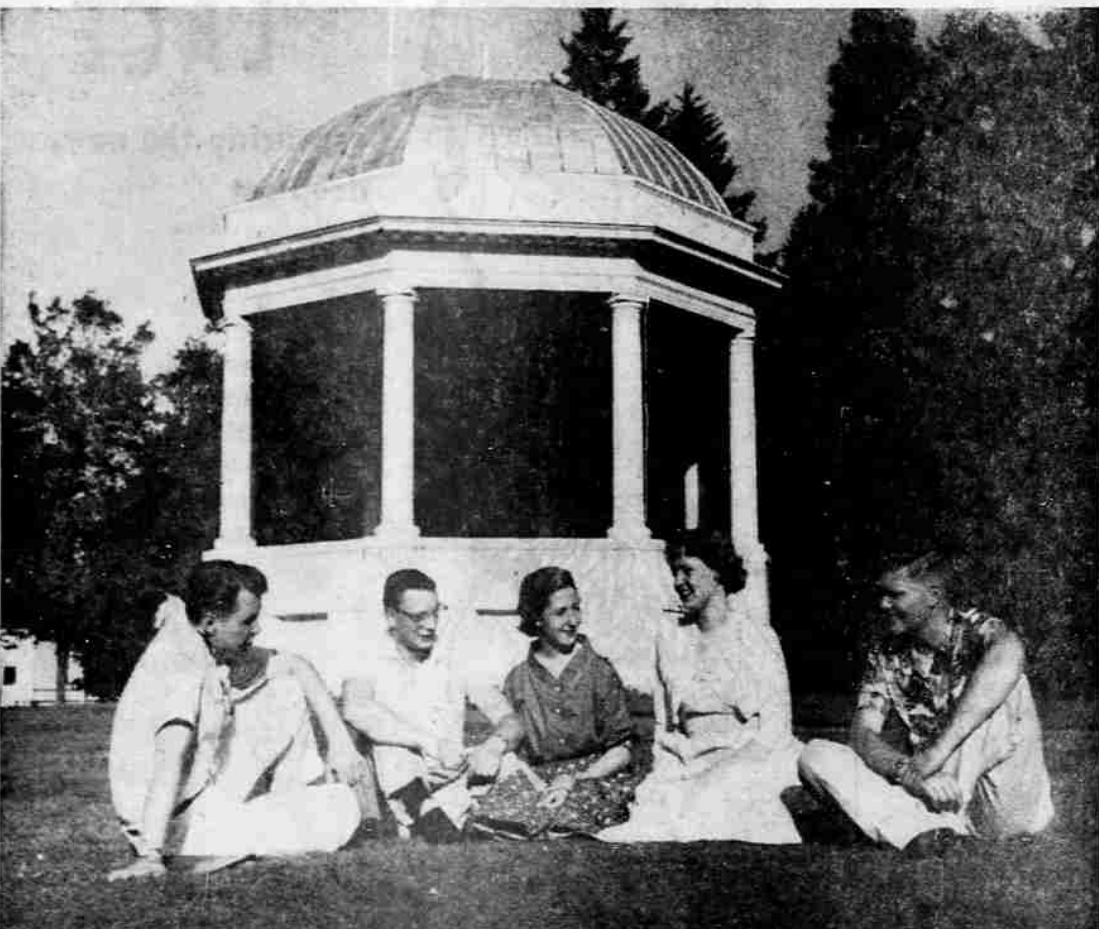
