

Black Tornado Thinclads Gain Five Titles in Northwest AAU

Les Lingscheid, Jerry Close, Neil Plumley of Medford and a Medford relay team captured championships in the high school division and Johnny Jones of Medford took a title in the junior division Saturday in the Northwest AAU track and field meet at Portland.

Lingscheid won the half-mile in 2:02 and Close established a new broad jump mark of 22 feet 5 1/2 inches. Plumley took the shot put with 56-8, the best effort of his prep career.

The Medford 880-yard relay squad, made up of three half-milers and a sprinter, beat Pendleton and Oswego, by 15 yards in 1:35.1. Lingscheid, Bilbee Lane and Winchell and dashman Jones, anchoring, made up the crew.

Jones won the junior 100-yard dash in 10.4 and was second in the 180 in :19.1.

Trio Denied
The half-mile triumvirate was denied in its aim of a three-way effort under two minutes. Lane, the state high school champ, was five yards back of Lingscheid. Winchell, who was boxed in and couldn't shake loose, was seventh in the field of 23.

Junior bracket placers for Medford included Bruce Boldenow, second in the javelin with a throw of around 155 feet; Frank Albert, fourth in the shot with a put of 53 feet plus; Dave Bergman, fifth in the high jump, and Roger Johnson, sixth in the mile. Terry Hamilton failed to place in junior hurdles and Ron Reich didn't get a place in the junior 440-yard run.

Three ex-Medford high athletes did well in the college division of the meet. Jack Morris was first in the 400-meter hurdles in :55.3 and Don Spinas was second. Ed Bingham won the javelin with 207 1/2. Morris and Spinas were on the winning mile relay team.

The three are University of Oregon varsity trackmen.

Portland—(U.P.)—Jim Bailey, the first man to crack the four-minute mile in the United States, led the way through the Oregon AAU track and field meet here Saturday night, cracking the meet record for the 880 and touring the two laps in 1:54.4.

Bill Dellinger, the other half of Oregon's crack distance duo, won a special 5000 meter event, going the extended distance in 14:40.2.

Dellinger was a double winner, capturing the two-mile in 9:29, considered good in light of his upcoming 5000 meter jaunt.

Dean Benson, NAIA high hurdle national champion, was the only man other than Bailey to crack a meet record. Benson established a new standard in the high obstacles of 14.2, shattering the record set in 1952 by Bob Mathias of Stanford in 14.3.

Pirates Hold Brief Lead

Milwaukee, Wis. — (U.P.) — The amazing Pittsburgh Pirates, in the National League lead briefly Sunday for the first time since 1948, accepted the distinction with the calm and indifference a perennial front-runner might display.

In the locker room after their conquest of the Milwaukee Braves, 3-1, in the opening game of a doubleheader, photographers, reporters and TV cameramen had to egg on the Pirates to show excitement about their scant hold on the National League lead.

A Pittsburgh club last led the league on May 10, 1948, except for the opening day of the 1950 season when the Pirates were also on top briefly. Milwaukee made Pittsburgh's current hold on the top rung a brief one by winning the second game Sunday, 4-3, and moving back into command with a 606 to 600 percentage advantage over the Pirates.

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
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
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
