State Grange Delegates Face Many Resolutions

Pendleton—U.P.—The Oregon State Grange state convention rolled into its third day here today with some 700 members slated to take up a variety of questions brought before them in 70 resolutions that are up for action.

At yesterday's second day session, Master Elmer McClure said that Oregon wheat farmers got "shoddy treatment" in the Presidential veto of the original farm bill.

McClure also took the state legislature to task for the 45 per cent surtax on incomes passed by the last legislative body and called for the Grange to maintain its historical opposition to the passage of a state sales tax.

Blow To Farmers—McClure charged that the presidential veto of the farm bill was a blow to western farmers while the politically powerful Midwest received preferential treatment.

He said that in contrast to the rigid restrictions on wheat, corn men in the Midwest can ignore their planting allotments and still get high price supports.

McClure charged that the state surtax on incomes was "a deliberate attempt to make the impact of the income tax burden so great that people would turn to a sales tax as easier to pay."

He called for dropping the surtax to 30 per cent and restoring the exemptions to \$600.

Salem—U.P.—State Treasurer Sig Unander will leave Salem Sunday for New York City to sign \$1,900,000 in State Board of Higher Education bonds.

The bonds were sold by the board on competitive bids to Juhn, Loeb and Co., and five other bond dealers. They will be repaid out of revenues received from students using the buildings.

The buildings are two dormitories and a cafeteria for men at Oregon State College.

Unander said the board plans selling an additional \$2,400,000 in building bonds Aug. 7 to provide funds to construct a dormitory at the University of Oregon, a student center at Portland State College and a college union building at Southern Oregon College at Ashland.
