

# Medford High School Seniors To Receive Diplomas, Awards

## Idaho Power Said Within Rights in Hells Canyon Job

Washington — (AP) — A Federal Power Commission attorney said today the Idaho Power Co., of Boise, Ida., acted legally in starting construction in Hells Canyon before obtaining authority from Oregon state.

Leonard Easley told the commission the company complied with the public interest and provisions of its EPC license in going ahead.

Easley and attorneys A. C. Inman and R. P. Parry, for Idaho Power, asked for dismissal of a petition to halt the company's application to issue \$20,000,000 worth of short-term promissory notes.

The dismissal was sought by the National Hells Canyon Association. It contended that it could not be determined that the proposal securities were "for some lawful object" and compatible with public interest.

**Two Reasons**

Mrs. Evelyn Cooper, its attorney, based this contention on two reasons: That the commission's order licensing the Hells Canyon project is under court review; and that Idaho Power violated Oregon law by starting construction before getting a water use permit from the state.

Easley said the association's contentions were "unfounded." He said Idaho Power was required under FPC license to start construction within one year and complete the project in 36 months. The company, he said, "tried to comply with Oregon laws and had filed all necessary applications, but that the state failed to act."

## Santa Cruz Teen-Agers Irate Over Rock and Roll Dance Ban

Santa Cruz, Calif. — (AP) — Officials of this resort town, called on the carpet by outraged teen-agers, hastily explained today they didn't mean to ban rock and roll music, only the "obscene" dancing it sometimes inspires.

"There's no ban on an orchestra coming in and having a rock and roll dance," said City Manager Robert Klein.

"We encourage dancing by juvenile groups all summer long," he said. "We frequently have dances in Civic Auditorium and as long as they're properly conducted, they're welcome."

Klein's statement was prompted by nationwide publicity given Santa Cruz earlier this week when Police Chief Al Huntsman banned "suggestive" rock and roll dancing and any band that encourages it.

Last Saturday, a police officer closed down a dance in the auditorium attended by 200 teen-agers, some of whom had engaged in "obscene and highly suggestive dancing motions."

High school students showed up at the district attorney's office Wednesday to protest

what they thought was a ban against rock and roll music as such. They said they were afraid they were to be penalized for the actions of a few "out of town" couples at Saturday's dance.

Meanwhile, it was learned that the scheduled July 24 appearance of Fats Domino and his Eight Rockers has been cancelled. Manager Ray Judah of Civic Auditorium claimed Domino's music attracts "a certain type of a crowd" from outlying areas "that would not be compatible with this particular community."
