Tips on Eggs Given By Extension Service

Morgantown, W. Va. — (U.P.) It is not secret that eggs must be kept cold to retain their fresh qualities, but for success in cooking, homemakers are often in doubt as to when the chill should be taken off the egg in advance. Here are some temperature tips cited by specialists of the West Virginia University Agricultural Extension Service.

1. A high-quality raw egg separates into white and yolk most easily when it's 50 to 60 degrees F. An egg just out of the refrigerator is so cold that its white clings to both shell and yolk, making separation difficult. On the other hand, when an egg warms up to 75 degrees F. or more, the yolk tends to flatten.

2. For cake-making, eggs should be at room temperature to combine well.

3. Egg whites whip more quickly and to a greater volume when the chill is off. The best whipping temperature ranges from 64 to 77 degrees.

4. For cooking in the shell, take the chill off the egg before it goes into hot water to avoid cracking.

5. Hard-cooked eggs seem to separate most easily from shells when cold. As soon as they are cooked, cool rapidly in cold running water.

To remove any insects in the tight leaves or flower buds of brussels sprouts and broccoli, soak them 30 minutes to an hour in cold salt water.
