### Three Drivers Get Citations Following Weekend Mishaps

Daniel C. Clevenger, 72, route 2, box 744, Central Point, was taken to Community hospital by Medford Ambulance, Sunday after his car and another operated by Kathryn B. Neil, 65, of 52½ East Main st., Ashland, collided on highway 99 at Talent late Sunday night.

State police said Clevenger's car was travelling north on highway 99 when Mrs. Neil turned onto the highway from the Tally Ho drive-in parking area. Officers said Mrs. Neil's car crossed the highway and turned north, then Clevenger's car hit hers from the rear.

Mrs. Neil was cited for making an improper turn, officers reported. Clevenger is suffering from back injuries, hospital authorities said.

Lloyd Elmer Pitts, 42, route 2, box 19, Jacksonville, was cited at 4 a.m. Sunday for parking on the paved portion of the highway after his car was struck by another vehicle operated by Jim Henry Womack, 21, route 1, box 19-C Jacksonville. State police said Womack was traveling west on highway 238, about five miles west of Jacksonville, when he rounded a curve and saw Pitts' car in his lane of traffic. Officers said Womack applied the brakes and apparently skidded into Pitts' car. There were no injuries and damage to the vehicles was minor, state police said.

### Fewer Cases Among Vaccinated Youths

Chicago — U.P.— Surgeon General Leonard Scheele said today there were 75 per cent fewer cases of polio among children vaccinated with Salk polio vaccine last year than among unvaccinated youngsters.

No Citations, Injuries  
No citations or injuries resulted from another accident at 4:14 p.m. Sunday on highway 99 seven miles north of Medford. State police said, Hazel D. Wolff, 55, of 222 Benson st., Medford, was attempting to make a left turn from the highway. A pickup following Mrs. Wolff passed her car from the right, officers said. A third vehicle, operated by Oris Earl McElroy, 35, Springfield, was following the pickup and McElroy failed to stop. His car struck Mrs. Wolff's vehicle in the rear. Damage to the cars was minor, officers reported.

Dr. Hoffman Named Dean of Faculty  
Portland — U.P.— Dr. Philip G. Hoffman, dean of the general extension division of the state system of higher education for the past year, has been appointed dean of the faculty at Portland State college, it was announced here today.

"Among the unvaccinated, the attack rate was 29.2 per 100,000," Scheele said. "Thus the data show a reduction of at least 75 per cent in the rate of paralytic polio among vaccinated children."

The appointment, announced by President John F. Cramer, will become effective Sept. 1. As faculty dean, Hoffman will be in charge of the academic program at Portland State.

### U. S. Asked to Share Atom Power for Peace

Portland — U.P.— Dr. Willard F. Libby, a member of the Atomic Energy Commission, yesterday called for the United States to share its knowledge of peaceful uses of atomic energy with the rest of the world.

Portland — U.P.— Notice of public hearings on the Corps of Engineers' review study of the Columbia River and Tributaries Report now in progress, together with a brief summary of the basin development program, has been issued by Brigadier General Louis H. Foote, North Pacific Division Engineer.

Dr. Libby was the commencement speaker at Reed College here. He called on college graduates throughout the country to "help us devise new peaceful uses and develop the ones already being born—the first of which we hope and pray is peace itself."

The meetings are scheduled for five consecutive days, opening at Missoula, Mont., July 9. Other meetings will follow at Spokane, Wash., Lewiston, Idaho, Boise, Idaho, and Portland.

### Mother of Wolf Cub Pack Loses Job

Leamington, England — U.P.— Mrs. Dorothy Long, 40-year-old mother of a Wolf Cub pack, said today she had lost her job because she had an affair with a 17-year-old Boy Scout.

### California Man Held In Pasadena Murder

Pasadena, Calif. — U.P.— A 25-year-old man, who got an urge to kill "whenever I see a pretty girl," was held on suspicion of murder today for the slaying of a pretty 19-year-old secretary.

Miss Fink's body was found early Friday morning in an upstairs room of her grandparents' house. She had been stabbed several times in the throat and one of her breasts had been cut off. Her neck was broken and she had been criminally attacked.

### Wage Negotiators Into Crucial Work

New York — U.P.— The "Big Three" steel wage negotiators prepared today for their most crucial sessions in the two-week-old bargaining conference.

Management is expected to present to the union by Wednesday at the latest counter proposals sharply scaling down the 22 contract demands of the United Steelworkers of America.

Current contracts between the 650,000-member USW and 172 steel companies expire at midnight on June 30th. Failure to write a new pact by that time could trigger a serious strike affecting the entire economy.

The newspaper said secret negotiations are underway to interest a Russian buying mission in Irish stallions.

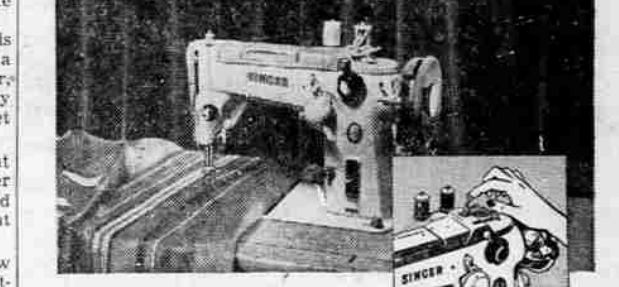
